Canada's 10,000-ton cargo ships are big boats. Enormous quantities of metal are required for their construction as shown in the above photograph. These vessels are of the same dimensions as the well known U.S. Liberty ships: 427 feet long, 57 feet wide, with a draft of 25 feet. They have a speed of about 10-11 knots. Five yards on the west coast and three in the east, with a total employment of 35,000 workers, are engaged in building these vessels.
