Sergeant Pilot R. K. Quinn of Prince George was among western airmen recently graduated the Calgary service training school of the Royal Canadian Air Force.

The Canadian Army is being requested by the city to clear the rock off the sidewalk and construct a bull rail in front of the ordnance building where the sidewalk was lowered on Second Avenue between First and Second Streets.

The matter of the enforcement of the Tobacco Restraint Act has been referred by the city police committee to the city police department as has been also the matter of enforcing the traffic bylaw as it applies to parking both of cars and bicycles.

Further work has been done by the city licensing committee on the revision of the trade license bylaw and it is hoped that the bylaw will be ready for presentation to the city council at its next meeting.

A bylaw to create reserve funds in connection with water and telephone services for the purpose of carrying out replacement work at a later date was given final reconsideration and adoption at last night's meeting of the city council.

The necessary authorization for Otto A. Pfeiffer of the city garbage truck to be brought under the unemployment insurance act benefits was put through at last night's meeting of the city council.

An offer of G. Basso-Bert to purchase lot 14, block 28, section 1, for \$250 was declined by the finance committee of the city council, it was reported at last night's council meeting. Mr. Basso-Bert's offer of \$250 was less than the assessed value.

Mayor W. M. Watts informed the city council last night that arrangements had been made for a new site for the city weigh scales adjoining Canadian National Railways property and that the Department of National Defence (Navy) would be going ahead soon with the excavation which it had agreed to carry out in return for moving from the present site.

Work of gunning the Acropolis Hill reservoir has been held up somewhat of late on account of exceptionally rainy weather. Mayor W. M. Watts informed the city council at last night's meeting. Every effort was being made to have the work done before the cold weather comes but the possibility of a water shortage in December, January and February was mentioned.
