ALLIES CROSS VOLTURNO

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN ALGIERS—Battling in heavy rain and mud, the Anglo-American Pifth Army has reached the Volturno River, the German defence line north of Naples, on a sixteen mile front from the sea to Capua, Allied head-Q uarters announced today.

GERMAN CITIES POUNDED
