**STEWART ELECTED**

Boilermakers in Vancouver Choose Him for Third Time Within Five Months

VANCOUVER, April 16 (C)—William Stewart was elected president of the Boilermakers' and Iron Shipbuilders' Union last night for the third time in less than five months. In December he had been chosen but that election was declared unconstitutional by the Canadian Congress of Labor. He headed the poll again in February but that ruling was ruled invalid in Supreme Court on application of the executive which was defeated in December.

Stewart said in a statement that the new vote should settle definitely any question as to the right of the Boilermakers' Union to hold an election.

**Organized Factory**

Countess Wharncliffe, mother of five children, helped turn out shells in her father's munitions plant during the First Great War. From her experience of 1914-18 she planned and equipped her own workshop when the Second Great War broke out, turning an unused garage into another cog in her country's war effort.

A sub-contractor, the countess now employs ten part-time workers in her tiny factory where, working side by side with the wife of a retired policeman, she is on duty eight to ten hours a day turning out nosecaps for bombs.

The Marchioness of Queensberry, descendent of the old Marquis who drew up the boxing rules, is one of the woman drivers of trucks and ambulances. Others are Lady Jowitt, wife of Sir William, paymaster of all Britain's armed forces; Lady Diana Tiarks—she's a dispatch driver—Lady Diana Stuart Wortley, Countess Manton De Rabie and Lady Waldgrave.

Lady Dill, wife of Field Marshal Sir John Dill, British military adviser in Washington, drove for the MTC in France in the early stages of the war. She now is lecturing in the United States.

Lady Louise Mountbatten, wife of the British Commando chief, works daily as a supervisor of nursing in St. John Ambulance Brigade.
