**Sport Chat**

There's nothing like a spot of sport to keep the boys on their toes, but the Canadian Army in Britain goes further than that. A "work-while-you-play" version of athletics has been adopted that gives relaxation and at the same time increases knowledge and speed toward handling war's instruments. Increasing in popularity, the stunt was tried most recently by the Army Service Corps of an Armored Division and competitions included sorting of ammunition and changing vehicle wheels.

A. Grindie, Birch River, Man.; C. W. Baker, Cookshire, Que.; F. Maloigne, Winnipeg, and G. E. Flear, Saskatoon.

Five lads from London, Que., were included in an armored brigade company unit which won the softball competition. They were Sgts. J. R. Paton and I. C. Hodgson, L.-Cpt. W. E. Blackwell and Ptes. A. Allison and L. C. Mote.

A sturdy signalman from Woodstock, Ont., emerged from the varied contests as outstanding athlete when the 12th Manitoba Dragoons held a track and field meet. D. Blewett, member of headquarters' squadron, won the running broad jump with a leap of 19 feet, 3 inches, and the hop, step and jump with a try of 38 feet 3 inches, to stand out as the only double winner. Just to show his versatility he placed second in the 220-yard dash, won by Tpr. N. Probizanski of Winnipeg. Probizanski finished second to Blewett in the broad jump.
