### CANADA'S **ECONOMICS**

Canada's Services Weak in Many Ways Says Writer Roundingup Security Plans of Vari-

ous Countries

In what he terms "a reconnaissance survey of a very large problem," Harry M. Cassidy, Ph.D., professor of social welfare, University of California, outlines a proposal for "Social Security and Reconstruction in Canada" (Ryerson). His book is interesting reading for students of present-day and

post-war economic problems. It outlines the present social security set-ups of the Dominion, the United States, New Zealand, Great Britain, and Sir William Beveridge's plan for post-war Britain, and suggests the outline of a plan to meet Canada's needs.

Professor Cassidy's outline gains interest in view of the recent report on social security for the Dominion which was presented to the parliamentary committee on social respect "to all aspects of the probsecurity by Dr. Leonard C. Marsh. lem. Dr. Marsh's report was issued too

late for comment in the book. Prof. Cassidy says "Canada's services are backward and weak in many respects" by contrast with present other social security systems, and that building an adequate system "will be even more difficult in Canada than in many other countries."

The book outlines the findings of various commissions in the minion-including the report on Dominion-provincial relations by Rowells-Sirois Commission.

Some Expectations

Prof. Cassidy says there are two major premises. First the social security program must be supplementary to a national economic policy aiming at full employment and agricultural prosperity. "The social security system should not be expected to do the impossible. Administration and financial responsibilities of the plan should be divided between the Dominion and provinces, Professor Cassidy believes, but co-ordination and some reasonable approach to uniformity throughout the country, under these circumstances, call for Dominion leadership with
