**CANADA**

The Department of National Defence is again appealing to owners of Colt, Smith and Wesson and Webley pistols or revolvers, of .38, .45 and .455 calibres, also Colt Automatic of .45 calibre, to turn them over for use of the Canadian Army.

The need is urgent. The United States, principal source to Canada of this type of weapon, currently requires almost its entire production to equip its expanding fighting forces and to meet commitments to the United Kingdom. Public co-operation and unselfishness is needed to help equip the Army in training at home so that it will be possible to release service weapons for overseas.

It is urged that patriotic citizens respond wholeheartedly to this appeal on behalf of Canada's men in uniform. The necessity is directed also to Reserve Army Officers on the Retired List. It is pointed out that if entitled to draw pistols later, same will be issued.

Weapons may be offered as a contribution or for appraisal and sale. Persons desiring payment will receive cheques directly from the Department of National Defence.

If you are not certain as to the calibre of your pistol, take it to the nearest Army Unit, R.C.M.P. Detachment, Provincial Police or Local Police who will be glad to advise you.

Pistols should be forwarded, unloaded, to Ordnance Officer, Postal Delivery Building, Fleet and Bay Streets, Toronto, by owners residing in Central or Eastern Canada, and to Ordnance Officer, Assiniboine Ave., Winnipeg, by owners living in Western Canada.

They should be tagged and carefully packed before shipment. Tags should bear the name and address of the owner, the make, calibre and serial number of the weapon, and should state whether it is intended as a donation or whether it is for sale. It is suggested that shipment be made by express. Charges will be paid by the Ordnance Officer at the receiving depot.

If you have not received this circular letter, get in touch with your nearest Employment and Selective Service Office.

Where it is necessary to quote the Employee's Insurance Number, use the number with the prefix letter shown on the front cover of the book; example P-49247, E-22454. Do not quote the book serial number printed on the inside pages of the book.

Protect the benefit rights of your employees by following closely the procedure outlined in the circular letter, and prevent delays by acting now.
