No estimate is given of the number of men of military age now subject to nossible transfer to other work but one spokesman said the new order would affect a larger number than the ast order of May 4. It covers men in the age groups subject to call-up regulations in the following types of employment:

1-Any occupation in or associated with retail stores.

2-Any occupations in or associated with manufacturing of feathers, plumes, artificial flowers, thewing gum, wine, lace goods, greeting cards, jewelry. 3-Distilling of alcohol for bev-

4 - Factory production of statuary or art goods.

5—Ice cream parlors and soda fountains.
