Alcoholism Seen by Evangelist As Greatest Menace to Western Powers.

True temperance teaches us to dispense entirely with everything hurtful and to use in moderation that which is healthful declared Evangelist Balmer in his lecture Sunday evening in the Oddfellows' Hall. Continuing, he said: "It is almost unbelievable that an enlightened people would permit the rationing of evil things at anytime. The greatest menace that confronts the western powers today is alcoholism. Although its sale is restricted yet the resulting evils are legion. Nations of antiquity passed into oblivion because of it."

The Evangelist quoted a noted Frenchman who said that, if France did not wish to die, she must begin by burning out alcoholism. The warning went unheeded. The sinister fifth columnist—liquor—contributed largely to her defeat in the present war and said the speaker, unless further drastic measures were taken to curb the consumption of alcoholic liquors in the armed forces and among civilians of allied countries victory would be delayed.

The speaker urged upon his audience to exert every influence to bring about total prohibition of alcoholic liquors which has been proved infinitely superior to the present system.

**TENDERS FOR CEDAR POLE TIMBER ON KITSUMKALUM INDIAN RESERVE NO 1, SKENA DISTRICT, B.C.**

Sealed tenders addressed to the undersigned and marked on the face of the envelope "Tender for Kitsumkalum Timber," will be received until 3:00 p.m. on Monday, the 15th day of November, 1943, for the purchase of all cedar poles on the Indian Reserve known as Kitsumkalum No. 1, Skeena District, Province of British Columbia.

This reserve contains an area of 1124 acres, more or less, and is reported to contain a stand of approximately 150,000 lineal feet of cedar poles, which is offered for sale at an upset price for cedar poles 20 feet and under, of three cents per lineal foot, and for cedar poles over 20 feet, of 3 1/2 cents per lineal foot.

Three years will be allowed in which to complete the cutting and removal of the timber under the provisions of the Indian Timber Regulations. The Indians of the Kitsumkalum Band shall be given the preference by way of employment in the work of cutting and removing the timber, and as far as the disposal of slash and debris is concerned the operator will be required to satisfy the Provincial Forest Service.

Tenders must submit their offer on the form of tender provided for that purpose, the bids indicating the price offered per lineal foot for poles under 20 feet, 21 to 30 feet, 31 to 40 feet and 41 feet or over in length; for railway ties and fence posts per piece, and shingle bolts per cord, and each tender must be accompanied by an accepted cheque on any Canadian chartered bank, for a sum representing a deposit of \$500.00, together with an annual ground rental of \$224.00 and first year's licence fee of \$50.00, such cheque to be made payable to the Receiver General of Canada and to be returnable to the unsuccessful tenderer; the highest or any tender not necessarily accepted.

Should a tender be accepted, the deposit will be held by the Department until the undertaking is completed to the satisfaction of the Minister of the Department of Mines and Resources.
