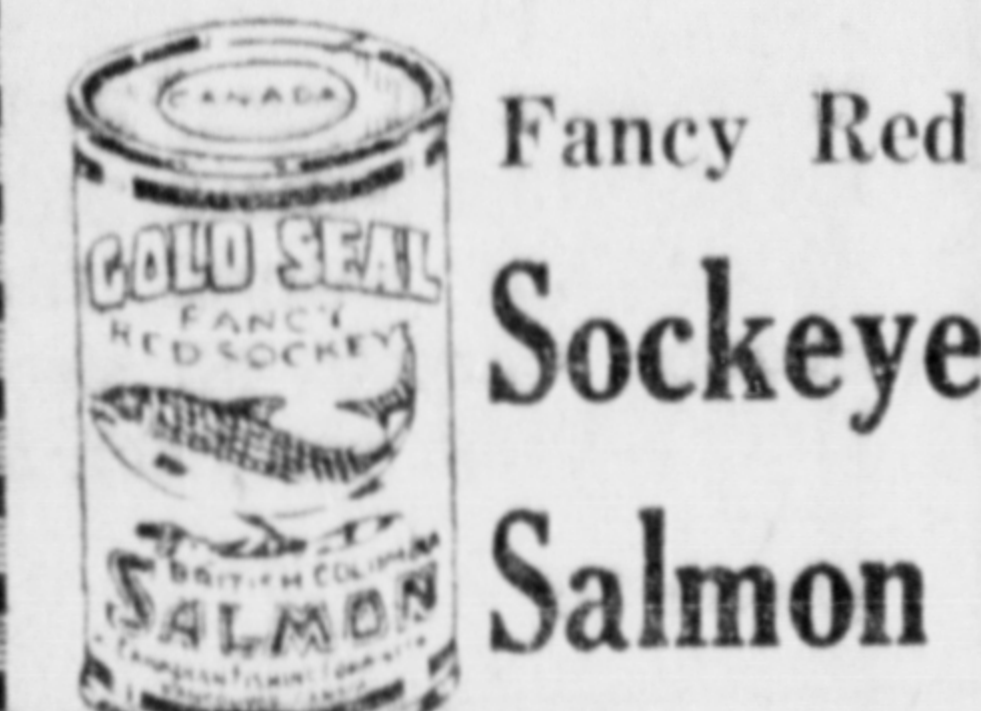

The electric light bills of the various schools, some of which seemed to be rather heavy, were questioned on being presented for payment at the meeting of the school board last night and it was left to the secretary to check them up.

The school board last night decided to communicate with the city council requesting that a sidewalk be put in on Biggar Street from Borden Street to Third Avenue. There would be a little material needed for such a walk it was felt, the most of the expense being for labor. The attention of the city will also be drawn to a dangerous excavation on Biggar Place.

J. R. Morrison is carrying on as janitor of King Edward School, there having been no success as yet in the efforts of the board to obtain another man to take over the duties from which he has resigned. The board is advertising another week for such a man.

The United States authorities are using a room in Borden Street School four evenings this week for gas mask demonstrations for the benefit of civilian workers. A fee of \$5 is being paid to the school board.

Inspector of School B. Thorsteinsson was on a visit to Kitkatla yesterday which made it impossible to accept an invitation to be present at the meeting of the board of school trustees last night. In sending his regrets last night, he expressed the hope that he would be able to attend next week's meeting.

Principal S. A. Cheeseman of Borden Street School inquired from the school board last night as to its feeling on whether or not each school child should be in possession of a gas mask. This was something that was entirely up to the parents, the board felt.

Trustee J. T. Langridge advised the board of school trustees last night that he had been unable to arrange a session so far with S. L. Peachy, secretary of the Steam Engineers' Union, following receipt of a letter last week suggesting that engineers of the schools were not being adequately paid.

Chairman Jack Deane and members of the Booth Memorial School committee are conducting an inspection of the grounds of that school this afternoon. The grounds have been damaged because of storage of lumber and heavy truck traffic. The view was expressed at last night's board of the school board that Wartime Housing contractors had been responsible and it was expected they would make the necessary repairs.

An application from the Civic Labor Federation to use the auditorium of Booth Memorial School next Tuesday evening for a meeting, at which Raymond Arthur Davies, well known writer and author, will be the speaker, was received at last night's meeting of the board of school trustees and, after some discussion, it was left to the secretary to determine what regulations, if any, governed the use of school premises for such gatherings.

Mrs. Jack Woods will leave on tomorrow morning's train for Brampton, Ontario, accompanying the remains of her husband who passed away earlier in the week. The funeral will take place at Brampton. There will be a service here tonight.

Marvin Joseph Bruce, charged with indecent exposure, was acquitted by Magistrate W. D. Vance in city police court. T. W. Brown, defence counsel, established that the charge against Bruce had resulted from a case of mistaken identity.

Tonight's train, due to arrive from the East at 10:30, was reported this morning to be ten hours late. Delays are still being caused to local trains not because of hold-ups on this line but on account of weather conditions on the prairies and in the East as well as heavy traffic difficulties.

Mumps and Cold Weather Affect School Muster

Attendance figures presented to the school board at its meeting last night showed 352 pupils—171 boys and a similar number of girls—enrolled at King Edward School and 220 pupils—112 boys and 108 girls—at Borden Street School. The reports referred to the effects of an epidemic of mumps and the extreme cold weather on attendance. King Edward having only 74.51 percent.

In the Senior High School the attendance percentage was only 73.82 while the Junior High School was 81.57.
