**Briefs From Britain**

Mrs. G. V. Riley has not used a clothes ration coupon since the start of the war as part of her "little war effort to mend and make do."

Owner of 24,000 rose trees, Charles Henry Rigg has died at Steeple Morden, Herts. He won the National Rose Society's amateur championship three years in succession.

It is stated that 10,000 Norwegians have escaped to Britain since their country was occupied by the Germans. Seventy-five per cent of the Norwegian air force consists of escapees.

Two boys aged 10 and a girl of 11 appeared at a Southend Juvenile Court charged with breaking into a Food Ministry emergency store and it was said they had eaten 22 pounds of sugar, 40 tins of milk, 47 tins of beans and 30 pounds of biscuits.

Correct title for girls who collect tickets on London buses is "women conductors" said a transport official testifying in a court case. Persons who called them "lady bus conductors," "bus conductresses" or "conductor-ettes" were wrong, he added.

**Timely Recipes**

**PUMPKIN CUSTARD**

1 cup cooked sieved pumpkin  
 1/4 cup brown sugar  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1/2 teaspoon ginger  
 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
 1 egg  
 1 cup milk.

Mix sugar, salt and spices with pumpkin. Beat egg, add milk and combine the two mixtures. Pour into greased custard cups, set in a pan of hot water and oven-poach in a moderately hot oven, 375 degrees F until set, about one hour. Six servings. The mixture may be poured into an unbaked pie shell and makes one medium pie.
