Final passage was given by the city council last night to a bylaw providing for certain changes in procedure of the council including the change from weekly meetings of the council twice a month on first and third Mondays.

Applications for water connections were received at last night's meeting of the city council and were laid on the table for consideration in committee when the whole matter of the water situation was to be dealt with.

The city council last night granted permission to the local Navy League of Canada branch to conduct a tag day on June 5 in aid of the Prince Rupert Sea Cadet Corps. Request for the permission was made in a letter from Alex McRae, secretary of the local Navy League.

A communication from the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities welcoming the membership of this city and suggesting that a delegate be sent to the forthcoming convention in Ottawa was received and filed at last night's council meeting. Among matters to be considered at Ottawa convention will be the effect of the war effort upon municipalities.

E. H. Hicks, who has taken over the Tassie Hotel on Fraser Street and renamed it the Fraser Hotel, had a request before the city council last night to instal steam baths on the premises. The matter was referred to the health, licensing and police committee, there being various requirements of the city to be met before the licence can be granted.

There was correspondence at the meeting of the city council last night from the Royal Canadian Air Force in regard to a pole line it is proposed to erect through a portion of the southwest part of the city past the region of the cemetery, considerable of it through unsubdivided property. Permission to put in the pole line was granted providing that where subdivided property is passed the line will be carried through streets and lanes.

Mayor W. M. Watts reported to the city council last night that Mr. Hennessy, who is establishing a wood yard here, had been given permission to use temporarily ground on Second Avenue next to the old Prince Rupert Club building for the storage of wood which had commenced to arrive by the carload. This was done so that demurrage might be eliminated and a place provided for the storage of the wood pending permanent arrangements.

A resolution declaring David Tummelson and Miss Dorothy Newcombe permanent members of the city staff for unemployment insurance purposes was put through by the city council at last night's meeting.

Rev. H. G. Watts of the Missionary Society of the Anglican Church in Canada left on last night's train for Winnipeg. He will stop off at Jasper. Mr. Watts had been spending a few days in the city.

Latest recruit into the Canadian Active Army at Prince Rupert is John Soluk of Athabaska, a hard rock miner who has been engaged at the dry dock. He leaves for Vancouver this afternoon.

Inequitability of city garbage service charges came up for discussion at last night's meeting of the city council. It was decided to leave the whole matter in abeyance pending the appointment of a new city engineer.

The new six-day-a-week train service in each direction on this line of the Canadian National Railways is now in operation. Trains are now scheduled to arrive from the East each night except Monday at 10:45, leaving each night except Sunday, at 8 o'clock. Tonight's train is four hours and thirty minutes late which would bring it in at 3:15 a.m.
