

# Mrs. Bernard Shaw Is Dead

LONDON, Sept. 14 - Mrs. George Bernard Shaw, wife of the famous author and playwright, died here yesterday.

John Stinson pleaded guilty in city police court yesterday to a charge of assaulting Edmund Hicks of the Tassie Hotel, causing actual bodily harm. It was alleged that Stinson broke Hicks' wrist when the latter endeavoured to remove him when he became boisterous in the hotel. On pleading guilty, Stinson was remanded for sentence for eight days and allowed bail in the sum of \$200.
