"I may say that the department is doing everything possible to improve postal service in that centre," says a letter from Hon. W. P. Mulock, Postmaster General, which has been received by the Junior Section of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce which complained against recently at the unsatisfactory mail service in this city, particularly as regard congestion at the Post Office. The Postmaster General makes no reference to the matter of street mail delivery service which had been specially asked for.

The postal staff at Prince Rupert has been materially increased. the Postmaster General's letter continues to say, and at present there is under construction building which it is proposed to use for postal purposes. ## VICTORIES FOR REDS

German Losses in Russia Enormous-Voronezh Offensive Continues Without Let-up

MCSCOW, Jan. 30-Further important victories have been achieved by the Russians in the continuing campaign to drive out the Nazi invaders from Soviet territory.

In the powerful offensive west of Voronezh seven German divisions umbering an estimated 100,000 en have been entrapped and face | annihilation.
