WAR IN TUNISIA-

AXIS IS BACKING UP FAST

Shows Elements of Haste and Panic Although Another Stand Expected

ITALIAN DIVISION TAKEN LONDON, April 13 (CP)- Algiers radio said today that the British Eighth Army had reached Enfidaville, twenty - seven miles north of Sousse and fifty miles south of Tunis, and nearly the whole of the Italian Vittoria Division had been captured. London sources said Axis armies withdrawing into the Tunisian tip totalled about 210,000 men, 150,000 of them Germans.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, April 13 — There are all signs of haste and panic on the part of Axis forces in their headlong retreat before the Allied armies in Tunisia. However, large portions of the enemy armies in southern Tunisia are PRINCESS not as yet completely cut off.
