**Briefs From  
Britain**

Two bottles of whisky, both more than 100 years old, brought \$460 at a Nottingham auction.

When Lord Wavell, India's new Viceroy, received the freedom of Winchester he was greeted by calls on the city's centuries-old moot horn.

Queen Mary has collected 3,300 garments this year for her London Needlework Guild, an organization which sends clothes to the poor.

Canterbury's member of parliament, Sir William Wayland, was fined £1 for allowing a bonfire to burn on his land at night.

Hon. Francis Wigram, 23, younger son of Lord Wigram, permanent lord-in-waiting to the king, was killed in action in Italy.

Capt. Harry William Rignold of Elstree, Herts, was awarded the military cross for gallantry as an army photographer in North Africa.

Three troopers in a County Yeomanry regiment were killed when a tank on which they were riding overturned near Gloucester.

Wing Cmdr. John Randall Daniel Braham, who has destroyed 16 enemy planes at night, has been awarded a bar



to his D.S.O. He also holds the D.F.C. and two bars.

The Ministry of Home Security ruled that flashlights no longer need to be dimmed providing the aperture is not more than one inch across.

Prime Minister Churchill announced proficiency badges are to be instituted for members of the Women's Land Army.

Cmdr. Ben Bryant, ace of the Mediterranean submarine fleet, was at a British port to greet his old command, Safari, on her return from 18 months of war on Axis shipping. Safari sank more than 50,000 tons of shipping, most of it while under Bryant's command.

Alan Andrews, assistant school master at Kingston, Surrey, was told by a conscientious objectors' tribunal that he could not keep his job as it was "not in the national interest for conscientious objectors to be teachers of the young."

Millions of sandbags provided for Air Raid Precautions purposes may soon disappear following an announcement by Herbert Morrison, Minister of Home Security, that they are "unsuitable for dealing with the new types of incendiary bombs except in special circumstances."
