**Question of Etiquette . . .**

Early in the war, the newspapers were kind enough to give the reading public explanations of the rank badges of the fighting services. It would be too much to say that they have all been remembered, but the average layman at last knows that some slight difference in rank exists between a group captain and a pilot officer. It is suggested that the press might now perform a similar service in explaining the gradations of the O.T. hierarchy. We have controllers, administrators, co-ordinators and co-ordinators, but how they are to be regarded by the lay public is a mystery. Does a director's wife precede the wife of a controller in going into dinner? Are there gradations of rank among the officials, so that the co-ordinator of tin cans is senior (or junior) to the co-ordinator of cat food? Official documents give no clue towards solving these mysteries of etiquette. For example, the recent order A-546 respecting office machinery is called an administrator's order. It provides for certain reports to be made to the director of office and accounting machines and it is signed by the co-ordinator of metals.

It was pleasing for the editor, strolling along Third Avenue early one morning this week, to notice the courtesy in which the soldiers on a United States army truck handled lady passengers on their way to work at the defence project offices. A set of stairs was lowered from the rear of the truck and, as each young lady ascended, a smart soldier offered his hand and assisted her up. Just an amenity that makes a favorable impression and too seldom is seen these days!

**Shipbuilding as Permanent Industry . . .**

This paper has argued that shipbuilding should be a peace time industry of large proportions in Canada and we have also urged that our shipbuilding plants should be kept busy after this war is over. To this policy some industrialists agree, others seem uncertain, occasionally we find a man who ridicules the idea. Here, however, is the opinion of a man who should really know something about it. Henry S. Ratcliffe of the British Ministry of Labor said on a visit to this coast: "Shipbuilding should be fostered as a post-war development on this coast—not viewed merely as an emergency wartime program. There is no reason, geographically or otherwise, to prevent the continued development of shipbuilding here as a post-war industry." He stressed that after the war there would still be a great demand for tonnage and the facilities are here to supply it. Even when the demand for deepsea tonnage slackened, he said, there would still be a demand for coastwise vessels.

"Less Peeping," who persists in declining to have his name published, has sent to the Daily News editor another of his masterpieces on the present liquor situation. Unfortunately, the letter does not contribute anything of value to the main issue but endeavours to justify the correspondent's unwillingness to permit his name to be published. He also presumes to instruct the editor in "press etiquette."

**SPORT CHAT**

Led by Sgt. C. C. Boyne of Fredericton, N.B., Canadian Army lightweight champion who scored the only clean-cut knockout of the competition, a team representing the Canadian Reinforcement Unit entered the semi-finals of the army team boxing championships with a 24-20 points victory over a Recce unit representing a Canadian division. Jumping to the heavyweight division, Boyne shuffled and smashed his way to a kayo over Lieut. J. S. James of Cambridge, Mass., one of two officers competing. The other officer, Lieut. T. E. Jarvis of Toronto, reinforcement member, lost to a Kingston, Jamaica, battler, Tpr. E. V. Armstrong. Classiest cuffer on the card was Tpr. D. Webb of Montreal, a little Recce fellow who was awarded a technical knockout over Gnr. B. Kovacs of Port Colborne, Ont., in the second round. Other Recce dingmen to receive the referee's nod were Tpr. L. Slabodian, a Montreal Golden Glover in 1940, and Tpr. H. MacFarlane of Truro, N.S. Reinforcement winners included L. Bdrs. W. W. Brass, Regina.; C. C. Pyle, Cape Breton, N.S.; W. J. Landry, Moncton; N. Nicolson, Winnipeg, and A. Ross of Niagara Falls, Ont.


Before a crowd of more than 1,000 the team fight title of another Canadian division went to a Recce unit a closely-contested tournament with Montreal Black Watch warriors. Tpr. W. Wilson and Cpl. C. W. Wilson, both of Hamilton, Ont.; and Tprs. C. Hogue of Peace River, Alta.; R. D. Rich, Stoughton, Sask., and A. Butwilofski of Luseland, Sask., polled victories for the Recce outfit. Black Watch winners included Pts. T. P. Ryan, J. Gauld, D. Sudds, H. Burden, S. Walls, all of Montreal.

**CANADA'S FOOD RULES**

- MILK**—Adults: one-half pint. Children: more than one pint. And some cheese.
- FRUITS**—One serving of tomatoes daily, or of a citrus fruit, or of tomato or citrus fruit juices, and one serving of other fruits, fresh, canned, or dried.
- VEGETABLES**—(In addition to potatoes, of which you need one serving daily)—Two servings daily of vegetables, preferably leafy green, or yellow, and frequently raw.
- CERFALS and BREAD**—One serving of a whole grain cereal and four to six slices of Canada-approved bread, brown or white.
- MEAT, FISH, EGGS, etc.**—One serving a day of meat, fish or meat substitutes: liver, heart or kidney once a week. Eggs, at least three or four weekly.
