

**Plastic Furniture
For Luxury Planes**

LONDON. —Nylon, used for the first time in aircraft furnishing, is to cover the convertible seat-bunks of Britain's new Short Solent flying boats, 12 of which are being built for British Overseas Airways' Far East routes.

The Solent will be the last word in "Flying Hotel" luxury. Its passengers will be able to sleep in comfortable bunks, look out at the scene below from a promenade and have drinks at a bar while flying at nearly 200 miles an hour. There are electric

POULTRY FOR ENGLAND
BRISBANE, Australia —Two shipments to England of 99 tons of dressed poultry, representing 78,000 live birds, have been made by the Queensland Poultry Farmers' Co-operative Society. This is equal to the average annual export from the whole of Australia over the past ten years and to two-thirds of the peak year's export in 1939-40.

**DROUGHT IS
ALLEVIATED**

**Light Showers to Heavy
Rains Have Occurred on
Canadian Prairies**

WINNIPEG —Precipitation ranging from light showers to heavy rains have occurred over the prairie provinces during the past week, thereby alleviating at many points the serious crop condition due to previous drought, according to the weekly crop report of the department of agriculture of the Canadian National Railways.

Seeding in all sections is practically finished and seasonal rainfall and warm weather are now required to hasten crop growth. There are still several points in Manitoba and the open prairie region where a good steady rain is required immediately to ensure a normal crop. Apart from isolated reports of outcrop damage and weed growth no serious setbacks have been occasioned by other than weather conditions.

Cool weather prevailed in the Okanagan Valley with several heavy rains and strong winds. Some hail damage over a 40-mile square around Penticton is reported. The cherry crop is now estimated to be 35 per cent below last year, while apricots, peaches and pears promise one of the heaviest movements from the Okanagan territory. Apples should run around seven million boxes. Vegetable crops are only fair.

STRIKES CUT PRODUCTION

CANBERRA, Australia —Strikes in the coal, steel and car battery industries in New South Wales this year have caused a production loss of nearly \$2,000,000, said Latham Withall, director of the Associated Chamber of Manufacturers, in a review of Australian production for the first quarter of the year.

The house, a 14-room building, had been vacated by the army over 12 months ago. Some time ago the mayor asked the government to turn it into four flats to relieve the acute housing shortage in the city, but got no satisfaction.

Then the police brought to him a family which had come to them in desperation as they could not get accommodation and faced the prospect of spending the night in the open.

The mayor sent an urgent telegram to Prime Minister Peter Fraser asking that the house be made available immediately. He waited until evening but got no reply. Going to the house, Mr. Mansford forced a window and admitted the homeless family which was waiting outside.

JOHANNESBURG, —The Bechuana natives—one man and one woman—living in the western Transvaal are both more than 100 years old according to a South African census office. The census officers calculate that the man is at least 125 years old, and his wife 108. The man is blind, but otherwise quite fit and his wife leads him about. They live with their young son, who is nearly 80 and a pensioner, on a farm near Potchefstroom. They saw the first white man and his wagons come into the South African interior.

As they have never applied for an old age pension, they recently had their first automobile ride when they were taken to town to get a pension of 10 shillings (\$2.25) a month each.
