London Fashions Feature Sloping Shoulders in Formal Dresses

LONDON (P) - Important changes are shown in the 1946 spring dress collections which were opened in London, recently by the Society of London Fashion Designers.

Sloping shoulders take the place of square ones on the very formal dresses in the first three collections shown by Hardy Amies, Charles Creed, and Victor Stiebel, all of whom have just been domobilized from the forces. The silhouette becomes a pyramid in the Amies collection, narrow at the shoulders, wide at the skirt hem.

Hips are padded and artificial, even on tailored suits, which alone keep their broad shoulders with waists very narrow. Dinner and evening dresses show 18th century influence with very wide skirts and closely fitting bodices with low decolletage only in front. Stiebel shows a very similar evening line with off-the-shoulder decolletages and victorian wool embroidery used as stomachers on dinner dresses.

Jackets of many afternoon suits are padded over the hips especially at the back. Tiny, pink ostrich feathers are sewn all over a black velvet full skirt as trimming. Charles Creed lowers the waist line and makes jackets to wear without blouses since he says women rarely take their jackets off to-

There are bold tweeds in stripes or checks from Cumberland and Scotland, much rayon satin and rayon tie silk (hitherto used only for men's ties) and some cottons. Notable are printed cottons and diaphanous sea island cottons, both used for evening dresses with striped cottons (processed like crepe de chine) for blouses.


