


#### The Moscow Talks

The text of the series of agreements reached at the Moscow Conference has now been published. There are no secret agreements and the results of the Conference are there in black and white for the world to judge.

The United Kingdom press of all shades of opinion has unanimously passed judgment that the Conference may be reckoned as a successful diplomatic enterprise.

London commentators observe that the three Foreign Secretaries set out primarily to attain two aims, one psychological, the other practical and specific. The first aim was to recreate the atmosphere of mutual confidence which had faded since last September. The second aim was to reach agreement on the control of atomic energy. As regards the first aim, this could only be attained by the three parties




