WHAT THE REDS COULDN'T TAKE THEY DESTROYED-Chinese officials are shown inspecting the ruins of the Akiwumei rubber factory in Mukden, Manchuria, which the Russians destroyed with demolition charges after removing what machinery they wanted. According to official Chinese sources the Soviets shipped 260 railroad carloads of machinery from Mukden daily, and up to 500 daily from all of Manchuria. Of some 900 factories, employing more than 2,000 persons each, only three were not stripped. On Feb. 9 the U.S. state department filed protests of the looting with the Chinese and Russian governments.

Sawlog scale in the Prince Rupert forestry district in March totalled 4,382,982 board feet, an increase of about 200,000 board feet over the February cut, but some 5,000,000 board feet less 10:30-Roundup Time than was produced in January. 10:45-Paul Whiteman's Orch. Sawlog production for the first three months of this year is 16,-460,453 board feet, compared with 16,150,309 for the same period in 1945.

Pole and piling production last month was 130,530 lineal feet, as compared with 561,197 in February and 410,167 in January. Total so far this year is 1,241,894 lineal feet. Pole and pining cut for the first three months of last year was 323,846 lineal feet.


