A distinct change is available locally. Where there is not going to be too much traf- hours after picking, the sugars fice, grass paths between flower changing to starches. beds will be satisfactory. Across the lawn, or where many feet will pass, something more enduring, like flag stone, brick, cinder or crushed gravel are advisable. For the sake of the man with the lawnmower it is desirable to have stones or other material as flush as possible with surrounder sod, and gravel, cinders, etc., should be fine and preferably pressed firmly so that they won't scatter on nearby grass. For roadways, crushed gravel, concrete, rolled asphalt, bricks, cinders, flag stone embedded in concrete, are all suitable. Where a loose material is used most gardeners keep weeds down by applications of commercial weed killers waste oil or rock salt. These help to bind gravel, too, keep down dust and discourage frost.
