Charging into the ninth inning with a 7-4 tie, Savoy slipped in two runs over the blue-clad Moose to clinch a 9-7 victory in a resumption of the city baseball schedule at Roosevelt Park last night. For the fans it was a good game, with climactic tension and only two scoreless innings.

The encounter showed a considerable increase in Moose efficiency, revealing the team as having a possible chance to carve out a major place for itself in the league despite its bad start.

Things looked pretty gloomy for the Moose in the ninth when they shoved Hector back on the mound to stop Savoy's merry-go-round. Hector, a pitcher of considerable promise, came through in thoroughbred style to pitch two strikeouts. Hector offset the danger posed by pinch-hitters Bury and Vukovich who were sent in place of Bill and Kerr respectively in the ninth.

Alex Bill, moundsman for Savoy, held the Moose down to eight hits, while Hector and Henry, Moose hurlers, allowed 11 hits. Postuk of Savoy and Kurdzel of Moose each scored two-base hits, the heaviest slugging of the game.

Linney and Karashowsky each scored two runs for Moose, while Savoy's shortstop Bruce Simundson and Pete Postuk tallied up similar personal records for the winners.

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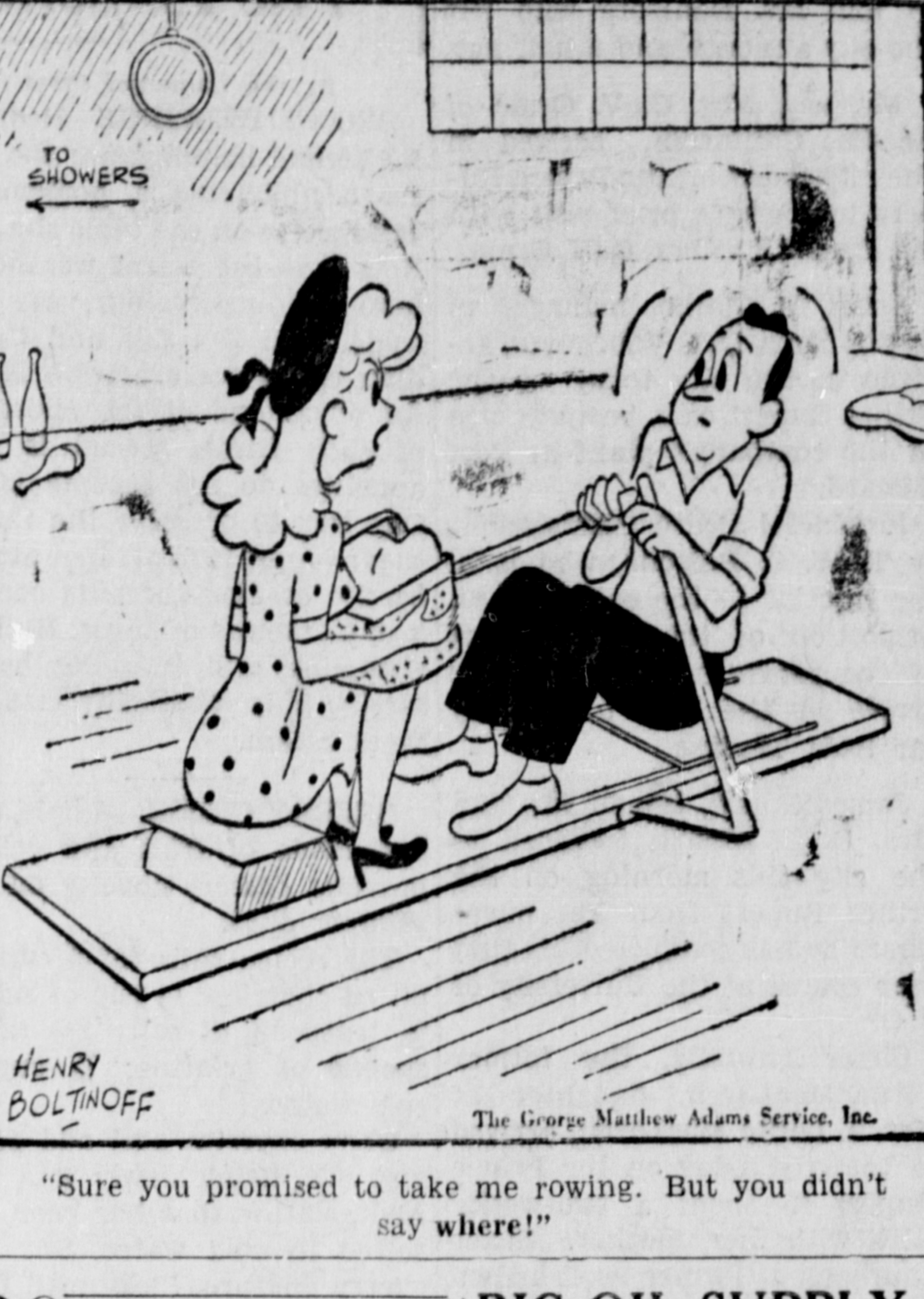
