## SATURDAY SERMON

### THE BIBLE TRUTH

By THE CARPENTER

To avoid future misunderstanding we would like to make it clear that we hold no exalted opinion of our own ideas. Every man is entitled to his own opinion—God created him so, that He might receive voluntary loyalty from his creatures, his subjects. Even God himself will not arbitrarily interfere with man's will to choose, but pleads with man "choose ye this day whom ye will serve" So no one else has any right to infringe on his God-given right. This is, of course, the reason for the terrible confusion we find ourselves in today and which so many would blame God for.

So your opinion is just as good as my guess, but that mine is of no value in "taking" the steep hills and sharp curves on the mountain highway of which I am not acquainted. What is of vital importance is the facts, so we watch the official sign boards. Realizing that God would not be less efficient than our faulty government, we came to the conclusion that He would not leave the dangerous road unmarked where he put us to travel. And having found that our opinion was valueless, we turned to God's official road map

The Bible. As there are no detours and no changes in the route, we have found it altogether reliable. That is why we "speak with authority".

Admittedly there are some spots of minor importance where the translators did not leave the meaning too clear. But as "all scripture is given by inspiration of God", He was also able to "move" the translators to make it so plain in all essential points that "the wayfaring man, though a fool, may not err therein". Our position is that the Bible does not contain the Word of God, but IS the Word of God. Our difficulties are generally due to our ascribing "traditions received from your fathers" or "traditions of the elders" or even our own "imagination"—that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, falsely to the Bible, instead of believing the scripture "as it is written". — "the holy scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation through faith which is in Jesus Christ"


