Juvenile School Feature of Mill

BRADFORD, Eng. (P)-A training school where young employees are received when they 'enter the mill" is a feature of the Grange Shed cotton mill in Bradford. Brightly-colored looms and skilled instructors are provided in a special room for the juveniles. They work here for about three months and are paid the standard rates of wages for young people. Until they are 21 trainees attend evening classes, fees being paid by their employers. The firm claims there are no blind alley jobs at Grange Shed and encourages parents co visit the mill to see their children in training. This welfare effort is one of many in the United Kingdom cotton industry.
