

NEW LIGHT FOR FUTURE HOMES

Glowing Color Schemes to Be Applied to Whole House

NEW YORK—The homes of tomorrow generally will be smaller units than those today with large main rooms and small sleeping rooms, designed for the most comfortable living we ever have had. Their decoration will feature more rich glowing color and architectural uses of light. That comes from Miss Bertha Schaefer, New York interior decorator, specialist in the decorative use of glowing color, paintings and light. "The servant problem is particularly responsible for a trend toward less expansive living," said Miss Schaefer recently in her New York studio-gallery. "This does not indicate that all city dwellers will be squeezed into two and three-room apartments. But it does indicate there will be fewer eight and twelve-room units and more of four or five rooms. Furniture will be decidedly functional, such as a dining table that is also a library table or desk or that has a game table top. "In decoration we shall make more and unusual use of light, often using it architecturally. For instance, where you wish that a wall were not, you can 'eliminate' it by making it glow. It can be hung with pale colored curtains, lit from above with concealed fluorescent light so that it becomes a wall of light. Powerful light in lamps will be filtered through metal fins, which deflect it to certain objects.

Rich Colors To Be Used

"Instead of monotone rooms—all gray, all blue, etc.—we shall make much greater use of rich glowing color. And instead of considering only the color scheme of a room, we shall consider the color scheme of a house.

"For instance, in a house which I decorated recently, the walls of the large entrance hall were seafoam green with touches of white and strong green. On one side this led to a room with seafoam green paint and tangerine accents; on the other side to a living room whose soft green background was offset by brilliant chintzes in red, yellow and blue. These rooms, varied as they were, were tied together by the repetition of green." Miss Schaefer, a decorator of years standing and a member of the American Institute of Decorators, combines her 57th Street studio for interior design with an art gallery featuring the work of modern painters and pottery designers.

HOW CAN I ???

Q. How can I avoid watering of the eyes when peeling onions?
