OTTAWA (CP) - Majority opinion of justice of the Supreme Court of Canada is that the federal government has the power to deport between ten and fifteen thousand of 24,000 Japanese in Canada, it was disclosed in the judgment The broadcast from Vatican which was handed down today. inion that orders - in - council The address began after the authorizing deportation of the Pope had placed birettas on the Japanese were not ultra vires of heads of 29 of 32 new cardinals the Governor-General in Councreated at Monday's secret con- cil either in whole or in part Two justices were of the opinion that the Governor - in - Council has the authority to deport Japanese nationals, British subjects of Japanese origin and Canadian-born Japanese who requested that they be sent to Japan but did not have the power to deport wives and children of men in the three classes.

> In delivering judgment, Chief Justice Rinfret said the court orders - in - council were intra vires except as to forceful deportation of wives and children of those to be sent or who wish to be sent to Japan. Four justices, he said, felt this section of the orders was ultra vires while three justices felt it was intra vires. There were certain other reservations by some o the justices, he said.

Rabbi Vineberg of Toronto describes the judgment as an "unfortunate decision."

Few British Columbia Japanese will be saved from deportation under the judgment.

"MEET" BOAT AT TOP OF RAMP

Neither the C.N.R. nor the weather showed much sympathy for the little band of "Jobs For All" picketers, whose perseverence supported them in their slogan march on wind-swept Second Street this morning. They seek contracts for Prince Rupert Dry Dock.

The picketers—three in number-followed up their Saturday morning display with a demonstration when the steamer Prince Rupert docked shortly before noon today-although considerably removed from the C.N.R. wharf.


Denied access to C.N.R. property by railway authorities, the little group took their stand on Second Street not far from the top of the ramp to the wharf. They paraded up and down the street carrying their placards which sometimes threatened to get out of control in the strong wind.

Mrs. J. R. Blakey, picket captain, looked at the flow of automobile triffic which whizzed by, and calculated maybe they had made a tactical mistake in not picketing on Sixth Street where most of the pedestrian traffic from the boats enter the downtown area.

"We'll picket on Sixth Street next time," she said confiden-

DEMANDS PROBE IN INDONESIA-Addressing the United Na-Box general assembly in London, Eug., Dr. Dmittl Amenilate chief of the Ukrainian delegation, demanded that a U.N.O. commission investigate activities of the British in Indonesia. He charged that the British had attacked Indonesian natives, but said he was not asking for withdrawal of British troops from the Indies. In reply, Britain's Ernest Bevin said, "I give you the lie that the British attacked the Indonesians." Bevin said that British troops were obliged to fire to protect themselves after they were attacked by Indonesian extremists.

Spy'Master Mind' Is Taken By Police

OTTAWA (CP) - The Ottawa Journal said today that Royal Canadian Mounted Police have caught the alleged "master mind" of the foreign spy ring operating in Canada. The agent, whom the newspaper identified as operating under the alias of "Arthur Adams," said that "Adams" was reported to have been in the pay of the Soviet espionage service since 1938.

The Journal said that "Adams" had been trailed by counter espionage agents since he entered Canada last December, and picked up by the R.C.M.P. last Friday.
