Nurse Advances From Pioneer Post to Executive Position

Red Cross Society Appoints First National Director of Nursing

TORONTO. — From public health nursing in the pioneer areas of Alberta to an administrative post with a national society is just part of the career of Helen A. McArthur of Edmonton.

She has driven dog teams as a public health nurse in the Peace River Block and entertained visiting celebrities in an outpost hospital. Now she is turning to a city desk job and will help to direct the work of nurses who staff Red Cross hospitals on the fringes of Canadian civilization.

Recently appointed as first national director of nursing for the Canadian Red Cross Society, she will undertake the closer coordination of nursing with other aspects of the society's program such as outpost hospitals, Junior Red Cross and first aid, swimming and water safety. She will also act as a liaison between the nursing profession and the work of the society.

Tall, blond and enthusiastic about nursing, Miss McArthur is planning a trans-Dominion trip to get an overall picture of Canadian nursing needs as related to Red Cross services.

To Integrate Services

"Since Red Cross programs are organized provincially, my work is to integrate its nursing services so that the Canadian Red Cross can make the best possible nursing contribution to Canadian life," said Miss McArthur. "Outpost hospital work is the most important aspect of

the society's nursing program and I hope to be able to direct the nurse who wants to do some pioneering into this line of work."

Miss McArthur's experience in hospitals, district nursing areas and for two years as director of the public health nursing divi-

sion in Alberta's department of public health, has fitted her well for the administrative position she has just assumed. She holds degrees in nursing and science from the Universities of British Columbia and Alberta and received a master of arts degree on a Rockefeller Foundation Fellowship at Columbia University.

She has close connections with the nursing profession and is at present vice-president of the Council of the Alberta Association of Registered Nurses.

70-YEAR SCHEME TO REBUILD HULL

Hull, England (Reuters) — A 70-year plan for the rebuilding of Hull, one of England's worst blitzed cities, has been announced.

The work of Sir Patrick Abercrombie, leading British town-planner, it provides for an increase from the present 320,000 population to an ultimate 500,000, with a "green belt" around the city limiting further expansion and safeguarding agriculture.

Highlight of Sir Patrick's plan is a 1,500-yard suspension bridge over the Humber. It will cost \$24,000,000.

The plan provides 300 per cent more acreage for open spaces within the city than previously, and a shopping centre to serve 500,000 people. Slums behind the docks are to be eliminated and Sir Patrick says his plan envisions a two-storey house for everybody.

While observing that the "medieval port of Hull is still living and has been retained in the plan," Sir Patrick's report, already approved in principle by city council, recommends a "bold proposal" for damming the River Hull, increasing its connection with the Humber docks and extending its industrial frontage.
