

rerainly it cannot be said that Mr. Ilsley's budget exceeded any hopes or expectations that might have been entertained in the way of taxation relief.

What measure of relief as has been accorded has been conserva-

tive enough and such amelioration of the personal income tax as is granted does not even become available this year but its application is deferred until 1947. Therefore, when it comes income tax payment time again next spring, the basis will be still the same as it was this year.

Reductions in taxation on business, certainly due, are not as substantial possibly as might have been hoped for. Such as they are they are welcome.

Mr. Ilsley is grimly realistic when he reminds us that there are bills still to be paid and that we must raise the money to pay them. It is to be noted that he also mentions the differences between the Dominion and provinces on taxation matters were so irreconciliable that the possibility of an agreement being reached could not be taken into account in budget plans for this year.
