

LOCAL AERO CLUB

FLYING is an up-to-date thing these days. With travelling by air now a matter of course, it should not be long before privately-owned and driven planes are almost as common as automobiles were when some of us were young. So it is fitting that aviation enthusiasts of Prince Rupert—experienced or otherwise—should be getting together in such an organization as an Aero Club, the preliminaries in connection with which have been started after having been suggested by the Daily News several weeks ago.

In fact as we have pointed out before, Prince Rupert is already a little late in getting its Aero Club started for such clubs have been active for a long time in many places even smaller and less important than this city. In this district the villagers of Terrace and Smithers already have their flourishing Aero Clubs.

The amateur aviation organization will be instrumental in providing training for would-be private fliers, it will increase the air-consciousness of the people generally and, what may be more important, its existence and activity will fit in well with Prince Rupert's development as a commercial air centre.

So the newly-formed Aero Club is deserving of our best wishes and support.

OUR FOREIGN MINISTER

IT HAS BEEN felt for some time that it might be advisable for the Prime Minister to relinquish the office which he has traditionally held as Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs—not that he is not Canada's most eminent statesman and diplomat but because it has been felt that to be the active director of both the internal and external affairs of this country, greatly increased in stature as a nation these last few years, has been a dual task beyond the physical capacity of any one man. Mr. King now has, evidently, admitted the fact himself so he has appointed Mr. St. Laurent to take over the external affairs portfolio so that he (Mr. King) may apply himself more fully to affairs at home.

It is appropriate as Mr. King lays down the foreign affairs portfolio to pay tribute to the effectiveness, dignity and rare diplomacy which he has exercised in that capacity over so many difficult years. He has been

as great a foreign minister as any nation has ever had, even if he has been most unobtrusive. His influence has been felt and respected throughout the world and most recently of all at the recent Paris peace conference.

As for his successor, it would appear that no more fitting choice could have been made than that of Mr. St. Laurent who has been an apt understudy of the Prime Minister and whose capacities and qualifications should serve him well in the highly important office. The fact that he is a French-Canadian may also fit in happily with his choice.

The whole move will, no doubt, meet with general approbation.

PALESTINE

THE BASIC STRUGGLE in Palestine is between opponents and proponents of Zionism. Zionism is the movement for establishment of a Jewish national home in Palestine and it has powerful supporters abroad, Jewish and non-Jewish. Britain promised to open Palestine to Jewish resettlement during World War I and has regretted the promise ever since. America was for the plan, with reservations. Now it is quarreling with Whitehall over the way to set it up.

The Jews want Palestine to themselves. Britain thinks it might be partitioned between the Jews and the Arabs. The Jews say they can't survive anywhere else and they resent being chased away when their refugee ships arrive. The Arabs say there'll be war if more Jews are admitted.

Russia wants control of the Middle East, of its oil, its Suez Canal and its Arab world. That is one reason Moscow is not pressing Turkey as warmly as it looked for a while over the Dardanelles issue; she does not want to antagonize the Arabs in non-Turkish states.

Thus Britain and America are in a first-class jackpot. Either they find another place to settle Ahaseurus, the wandering Jew, or they face a showdown in which the Soviet well might win. That would not be of great benefit to the Mohammedan, whose one god is Jehovah and whose prophet is Mohammed. For the Russians have no god at all save earthly power. But we have not as yet offered the Arab anything to take its place.

SUNSHINE IS BELOW 1945

However Rainfall Has Been a Little Less This Year Than It Was Last

In spite of all this fine summery weather, Prince Rupert's sunshine this year is not up to the volume of last although there has been a little less rainfall so far in 1946.

The sunshine for the first eight months of the year has reached an aggregate of 618.5 hours as compared with 651.2 hours in 1945. Sunshine this August, amounting to 154.7 hours, compared with 166.8 hours in the same month a year ago.

The rainfall so far this year has been 51.42 inches compared with 52.43 inches in the corresponding period last year. Precipitation this August was 2.43 inches compared with a mere .92 inch in August 1945.

Ambulance Contract Is Ending This Year

Although President Frank Dibb was not very sympathetic to the idea as he feels that ambulance operation is not a hospital responsibility, the hospital board, at its meeting Wednesday night decided to renew an agreement with the city whereby the board commits itself to fifty percent of the ambulance operating cost up to a limit of \$400 per year. It will be made clear to the city, however, that this will be the last year for the agreement. The board authorized the payment of \$267 as the share of the ambulance operating cost due from 1945.

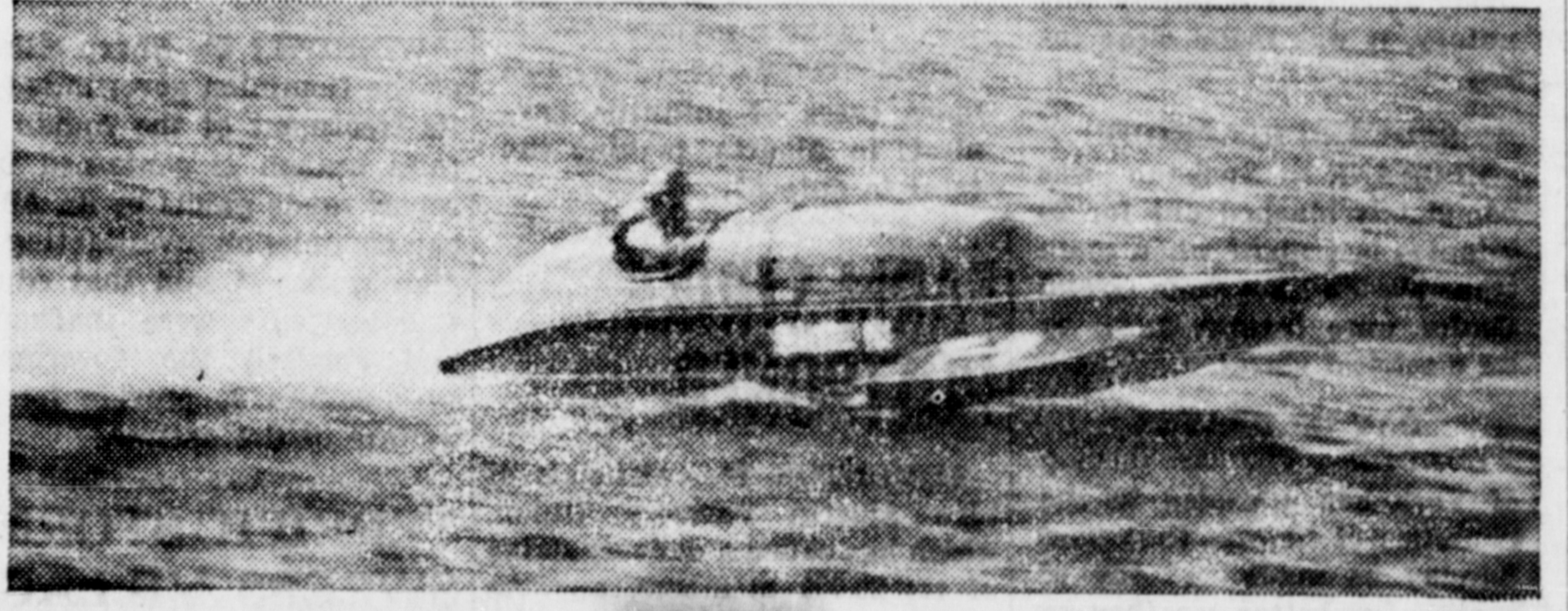

COMPLETING OF HARVEST

Manitoba Crop Nearly All In—Two or Three Weeks Yet In Alberta

WINNIPEG — The past week has been generally favorable over the entire prairie area and good progress has been made towards the completion of the harvest. This week should see the crops all in the granaries in Southern Manitoba but it will

be two or three weeks yet before the harvest is finished in Alberta, according to the weekly crop report of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railways.

Yields in Manitoba are above average and are better than expected and the grades are reported to be good. Saskatchewan shows a wide variation in yields with the grades being a bit disappointing. In Southern Alberta, crops are on the light side but Central Alberta and the Peace River areas have a better-than-average crop with some points in the Peace River reporting the best for years.

The Okanagan Valley reports fairly hot dry weather during the past week. There are still about three quarters of a million boxes of peaches and 70,000 boxes of D'Anjou pears to be moved. All vegetables are moving freely.
