## KIN OBSERVES CLUB BIRTHDAY

The story of how a Canadian veteran of the first World War, missing the companionship of his wartime comrades, founded a group which later spread to become the Kinsmen's Clubs was recounted to the monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Kin Club in Reid's Cafe last night.

The speaker was William Dixon-Lennett, a member of the Vancouver Kinsmen's Club, and his speech marked the observance of the twenty-sixth anniversary of the founding of the Kin organization in Hamilton, Ontario.

Founder was Hal Rogers who in January 1920, called a meeting of some of his old buddies to maintain their relations of wartime years. Out of this grew a social club which soon realized that companionship alone was not sufficient to justify the existence of the club—so it stepped into community service work.

As members transferred to other parts of the country new clubs sprang up, and these even-

tually were welded into the association of Kinsmen's clubs. They now number 150 in Canada and Newfoundland.

"The history of the Kinsmen's clubs in Canada and Newfoundland since their humble beginning is a highly meritorious one and one which, incidentally, is the envy of other service club organizations in the Dominion," the speaker said. "Through the willing efforts of our clubs thousands of dollars have been raised for community service work among children. During the war the equivalent of thousands of quarts of milk have been supplied to the children of Britain.

"No one can deny that we did a good job during the war. Now we face the problems of peace, and the reconversion of men from the armed forces to civilian life."

This, the speaker said, can be done on the basis of the objective of Kinsmanship which urges the fostering of co-operation,

tolerance and understanding between people and nations. Chairman of the meeting was Bill Jamson, and there was a good attendance of members.

## Build Gymnasium As War Memorial

VANCOUVER (C)—A \$500,000 war memorial gymnasium for the University of British Columbia has been approved by the board of governors and a campaign has been launched by a joint student-alumni committee to raise the necessary funds.

The gymnasium will feature a swimming pool, two basketball courts, wrestling and boxing rooms, a special women's gymnasium, archery and rifle ranges and an auditorium with 5,000 seating capacity.

## MANAGER OF HOTEL

William Gordon Foster from Winnipeg to Charlottetown

MONTREAL—William Gordon Foster, assistant manager of the Fort Gary Hotel, Winnipeg, is appointed manager of the Charlottetown, Charlottetown, P.E.I., succeeding Arthur H. Mould, who is retiring after many years of faithful service. It is announced by Robert Sommerville, General manager of hotels, Canadian National Railways. The appointment was effective Monday, February 18.

Mr. Foster is a Nova Scotian by birth, having been born in Antigonish, in August, 1907. Following his public and high school education, he studied at St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, and also at Queen's University, Kingston, and Dalhousie University, Halifax.

During the summer seasons 1930 to 1936, Mr. Foster was employed in various positions, at Jasper Park Lodge and was later room clerk at the Bessborough in Saskatoon. He was appointed assistant manager at the Nova Scotian in April, 1938, and manager of Pictou Lodge, Pictou, N.S., in June 1938. He returned to the Nova Scotian as assistant manager in October 1942, and was appointed assistant manager of the Fort Gary, Winnipeg, and relieving manager of the Canadian National western hotels in July 1943.

Mr. Mould, who retires from the management of the Charlottetown, has had many years of experience in hotel work. Born in Norfolk, N.Y., he started hotel work at an early age and held a number of important positions in United States hotels for 10 years before coming to Canada in 1923 to become manager of Minaki Lodge.
