

Librarian's Report For June Month

At the regular meeting of the Library Board last evening Librarian Miss O. Van Cooten reported that during the month of June 1,221 books were in circulation. Of these, 649 were fiction, 296 juvenile, 186 in the pay section and 90 non-fiction. Nineteen new borrowers had been added and ten had been cancelled, showing a net gain of nine. The total number of borrowers in the library was 2,016. During the month 57 books had been purchased and 18 had been donated. Forty-three had been discarded, leaving a net gain of 32. The total number of books in the library now is 9,366. Receipts during the month were \$12.89 in fines, \$1.40 from new J. N.
