## Attlee and the Press ...

It has been left to Prime Minister Clement Attlee of Great Britain to voice one of the clearest enunciations of the "Freedom of the Press" which we have heard. He spoke

to newspapermen, as follows: "There is no freedom more important than press freedom. "It is a freedom which belongs not to the press, but to the public whose agents in this matter the newspapers are—it is the freedom to be given the facis, national and international, on which sound judgment can be formed.

"Sometimes the newspaper's appetite for facts may prove embarrassing to politicians, but so long as you stick to facts we have no complaint.

"The opinions you express on the basis of those facts are your own affair. We can have no complaint if we don't agree with them. We only have a right to complain and the public has a right to complain

when facts are twisted or invented or when there are omissions which distort the whole picture.

"Let us have more facts. Let us have the freest possible flow of information between members of the British Commonwealth-let us work for the fullest flow of information between the peoples of all nations. No true interest of the ordinary people of the world was ever hampered by letting the truth be known."

# Matter of Conscience...

In contrast with our abundance of food, there are famine conditions in Europe and the Far East. Something is being done to relieve them, but it is still a fact that men, women and children throughout the countries that were the theatres of war are dying of hunger. More will die before relief can be made adequate to the need, but some may be saved if we, the well-fed, do something more about it than is being done, and do it in time.

tion of surplus foodstuffs are matters for government agencies to handle to the best of their ability. Making sure that surpluses are available is a matter for individual consciences. We are asked, not to reduce our standard of living, but to reduce our standard of waste. The half-eaten slices of bread, the scraps of meat left on a plate and thrown into the garbage can after an average family dinner are probably equivalent in calories to the normal daily ration for an

adult in some parts of Europe. If we make it a habit to buy only what we need, and to waste no food that is bought, the surpluses available for export will quickly mount. Some of us with expanding waistlines may do more. As a reminder, we may keep before us the picture of Europe's starving children, who might have been our own, had Hitler been successful, and ask ourselves, paraphrasing the wartime travel slogan, "Is this meal really necessary?"





# The Workmen's Compensation Act NOTICE TO EMPLOYERS

Effective July 1st, 1946, any employer engaged in the HOTEL, BEER PARLOUR or CATERING BUSINESS and having three or more employees (other than members of the family of the employer) employed at such work is deemed to be engaged in an industry under the Workmen's Compensation Act provided that:

(a) The employer in the hotel business operates a hotel, lodging house, club or other place where lodging is furnished and having in any case ten or more bed rooms, or

(b) The employer has a license to operate a beer parlour, or

(c) The employer in the catering industry oper-

ates a hotel, lodging house, restaurant, cafe, eating house, dance hall, cabaret, banquet hall, cafeteria, tea room, lunch room, lunch counter, ice cream parlour, soda fountain, dairy bar, nursing home, private hospital, club, dining room or kitchen in connection with an industrial or commercial establishment, or office building or school or any other place where food is cooked, prepared and served and for which a charge is made.

whether or not any such establishment mentioned in clauses (a), (b) and (c) hereof is operated independently or in connection with any other industry.

AND any employer operating an APARTMENT HOUSE or COMMERCIAL BUILDING in which rooms, suites or space is rented to a tenant and which employer has three or more employees (other than members of the family of the employer) employed in the maintenance, servicing or repair of the building

AND any employer operating a RETAIL STORE having three or more employees (other than members of the family of the employer) employed.

Such employers are now required to register with the Board by submitting an estimate of their payroll expenditure from July 1st to December 31st, 1946. Forms for this purpose may be obtained from this office, together with such other information as may be required.

The Workmen's Compensation Act provides that an employer who has not registered with the Board may be held liable for the cost of an accident occurring prior to such registration, in addition to the regular assessments. Address inquiries to:
