**VARDEN SINGERS
MAINTAIN HIGH
SONG STANDARD**

The high standard of musical integrity long established by the Varden Singers was maintained at their choral concert last night in St. Paul's Lutheran Church when the singers presented four groups of songs in Norwegian and English to an audience of 125.

The choral program was conducted by Peter Lien, choirmaster and conductor, and was embellished by three soloists, Master Roldal Fenes at the organ, Mrs. P. E. Anfield, vocal, and Vaughan Tattersall, violin.

A talk on the dignifying quality of song in the heritage of human development was given by Rev. M. Aalen of St. Paul's at the opening of the program.

Of the eight songs presented by the choir, five were in Norwegian and three in English. Assisting artist Roldal Fenes played "Summer Breezes" and "Pastorale No. 3" on the organ, while Mrs. Anfield sang "Sittin', Thinkin'" and "In a Little Old Garden." Violin solos by Vaughan Tattersall were the Bach-Gounod "Ave Maria" and "Moment Musical" by Schubert.

Following the concert, refreshments were served by Mrs. M. Nordgaard in the church hall to the singers and soloists. The thanks of the company were extended to Mrs. Nordgaard by Rudolph Olsen, president of the Varden Singers.

**Waterfront
Whiffs**

To Freeze Shrimps and Crabs—
Coquitlam Smart Ship—
Waterfront Quiet

Installation by the Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative of quick freeze facilities for shrimps and crabs is sending a number of local fishermen to the bays and inlets inhabited by those crustaceans in the firm belief that prices will not slump due to oversupply. Along the waterfront a number of boats are fitting their poop decks with tables used in shrimp fishing which they believe will be profitable this winter. Last year, the crustaceans fell badly in price when they commanded only local sale, due to inability to preserve them for the continental market. The quick-freeze process, it is believed, will cause a sufficient demand elsewhere to hold up the prices of shrimp and crab to a profitable level during a winter which is definitely dull from the fishing standpoint and which follows a poor summer, particularly as regards salmon.

The new Union Steamship Coquitlam, converted from a Castle class corvette at Vancouver, is one of the smartest vessels afloat in the opinion of Frank Skinner, local Union Steamship agent. Although the vessel is not due to make her first run to Prince Rupert until sometime in November, she was examined by Mr. Skinner during her trials at Vancouver while he was away on his holidays in September.

"The interior of the Coquitlam is the smartest and most luxurious of any vessel on the coast," Mr. Skinner said enthusiastically. The finish is completely modern and gives an air of spaciousness which makes the ship seem much bigger than it really is.

Exact date on which the Coquitlam will make her first run to Prince Rupert has not yet been released but it is believed that it will be during the early part of November.

This year's poor salmon run is having its repercussions along the waterfront, where things are inordinately quiet these days. Boat building and repair work, although showing some activity, is much quieter than it was last fall when fishermen had ended a relatively prosperous season. However, some flatfish and black cod is coming in to the cold storage plants.

No word has been forthcoming yet on the future of the American warehouse, which a

Calgary firm, Northwest Salvage Co. plans to use as a base for establishing a deep sea shipping business at Prince Rupert. The company's option on the warehouse and dock installations is said to be due to expire on October 24. The Meek brothers, who investigated the installations in August and September, have not yet returned to the city from a trip east for the declared purpose of consulting their financial backers.

**Returning to
Government Dock**

For months past instructions have been awaited whereby coasting vessels of the Canadian Pacific Railway would resume use of the government wharf as their mooring place. It was early in the war that the C.P.R. boats started landing at the Canadian National wharf following taking over of the government dock by the Navy. Some time ago the Navy moved out and it had been expected that, ere this, such vessels as the Princess Adelaide, Princess Louise and Princess Norah would be berthing there again. However, the final order is yet to come.

Calls at the Alaska capital port of Juneau, which had been suspended owing to the longshoremen's strike there, are to be resumed with the next voyage of the steamer Princess Louise, it is announced. The Louise is due here next Wednesday morning northbound. She was here on Thursday evening on her way south from Skagway and Ketchikan, having been delayed at Ketchikan awaiting passengers who were being flown from Juneau.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Alex McLellan, arrived in port at 11:30 last night from the south, sailing early this morning on her return voyage to Vancouver and waypoints.

The Department of Transport announces that a new light has been established on the southernmost tip of Porcher Peninsula at the entrance to Freeman Pass. The light is flashing, white, and is unwatched.
