

KETCHIKAN WINS THIRD GAME 41 TO 35 TO MOVE FURTHER AHEAD IN BASKETBALL PLAY

The Kayhi Polar Bears downed the local Bo-Me-Hi Rainmakers 41-35 last night in the third of the international High School basketball series. This puts Ketchikan out in front with a 15-2 lead in the total point series between the two towns.

Both teams started off very slowly with Kayhi themselves familiarized with the floor. They arrived at the end of the first quarter together with a 10-10 tie. Then, while Bo-Me-Hi led, the "Bears" turned on pressure outplaying the local Rainmakers to reach the first half on the long side of the score.

Coming into the third quarter Rainmakers were left far behind when Kayhi dropped quick baskets. Then Bo-Me-Hi suddenly came to life by the end of this period, leaped up to within two points of the Bears. The score at the beginning of the last quarter was 31-29 for the visitors. The effort that Kayhi displayed in the last quarter under the local hoopsters tries, being right to the final minute Kayhi increased their lead with the help of four pen-ults, to bring the mix-up to end 41-35 for Polar Bears.

Both teams were displaying superb balling contrast to the loose play of our local squad. How-when the Rainmakers take floor tonight it will be for a four-fold purpose. Mainly it is to win the game and by taking this last game at least sixteen points but, also to lift them from the slump they have been in for the past month.

After the games, a dance was held in the Bella Coola hall which was packed to capacity.

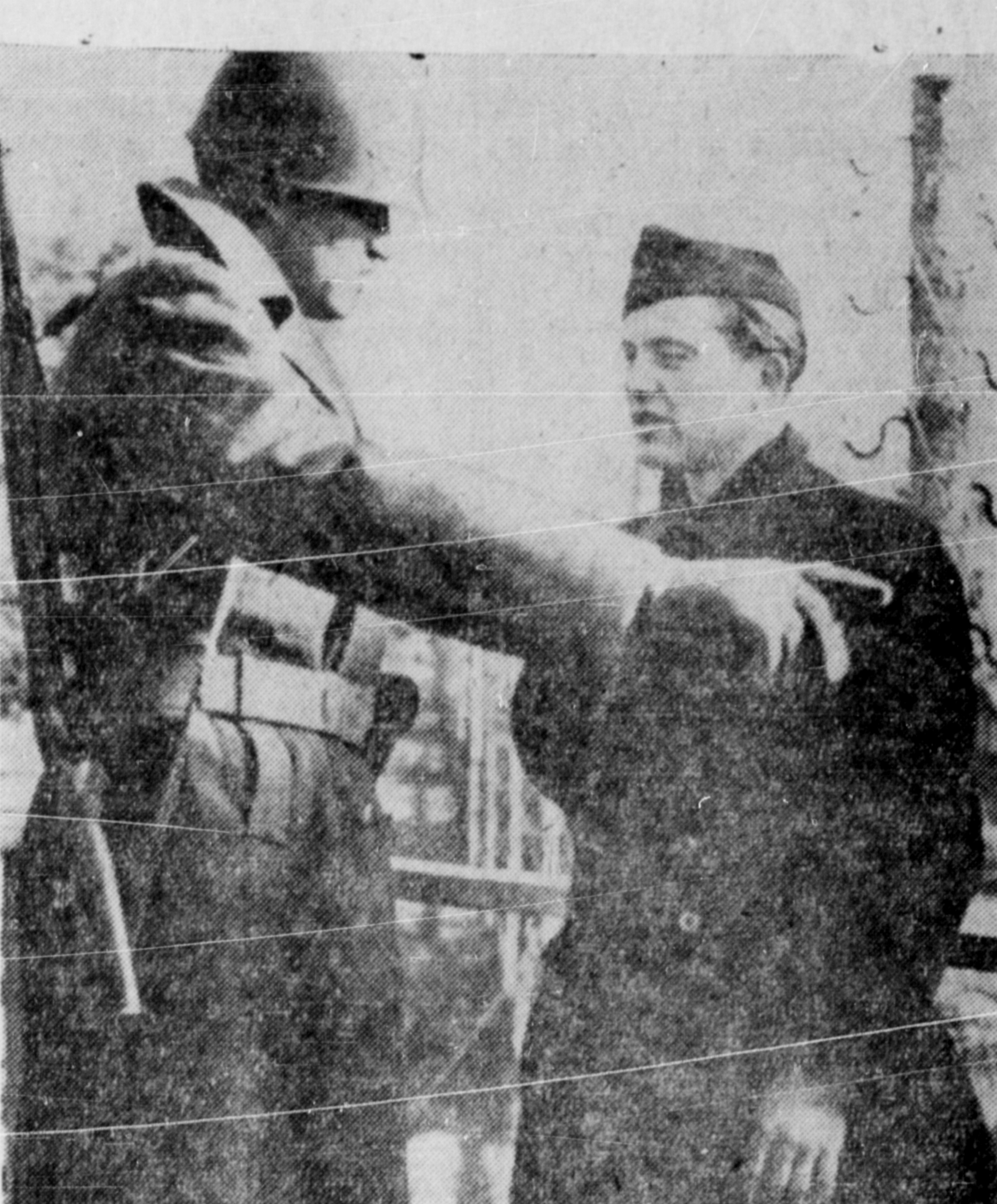

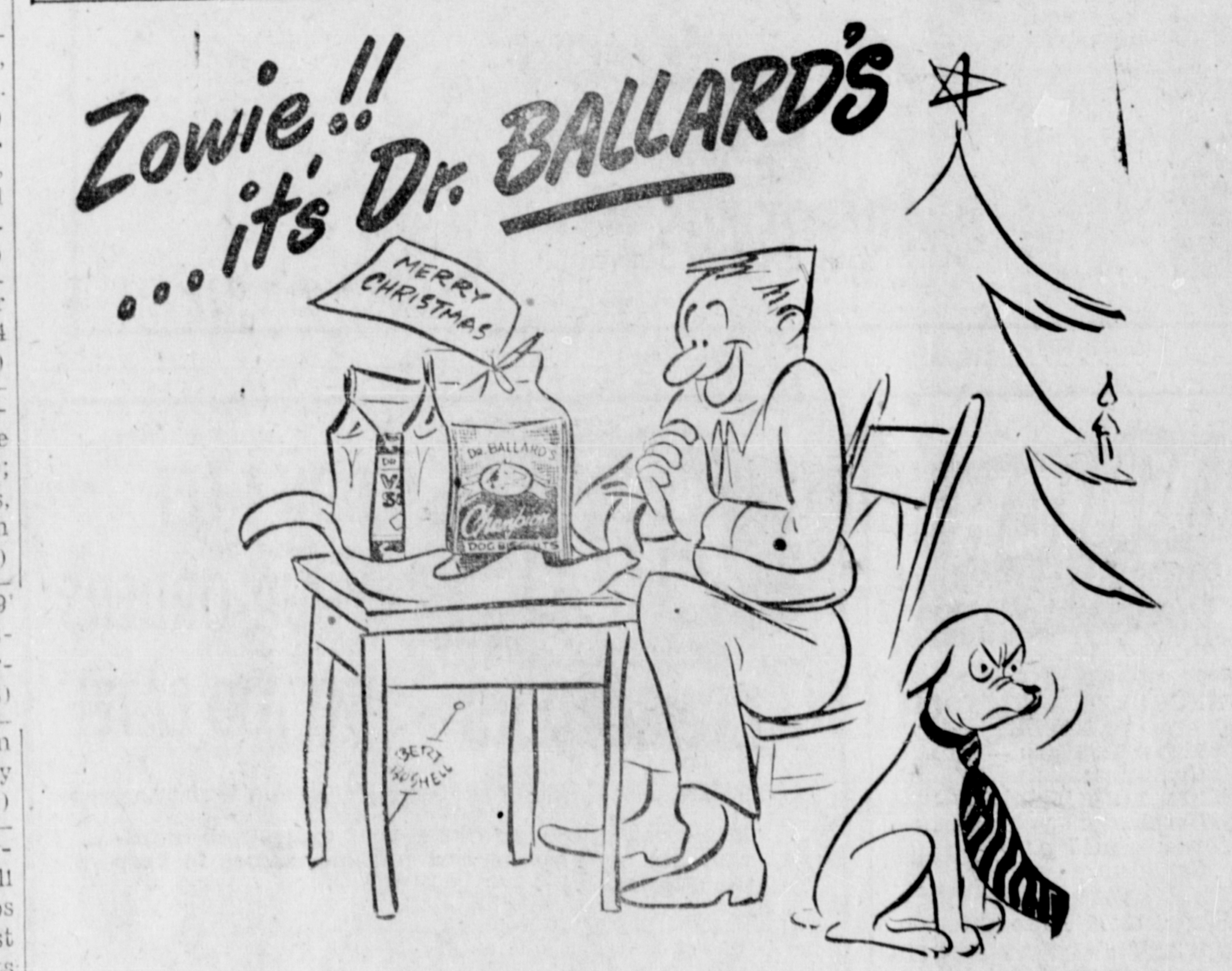
