## TEACHERS SEEK RIGHT TO HOLD ELECTED OFFICE

Seeking amendment to a portion of provincial law which bars employees of municipal school boards from holding elected civic office, Prince Rupert and District Teachers' Association last night presented such a brief to city council which endorsed it after short discussion.

The brief was one prepared by the B.C. Teachers' Federation for endorsement by municipal councils. It scored the "undemocratic" tendency of the present statute which deprives teachers of the right to sit on municipal councils. Basis of the claim is that school board employees are not direct employees of the municipality.

It cites as an example the case of a school teacher who was elected to the North Vancouver municipal council, only to be disqualified because he held an employment contract with the city.

Agreeing that it would be "democratic" to allow teachers to hold civic office, the aldermen pursued the matter to the point of wondering who would vote on school board estimates if

the electorate returned a full slate of school teachers to city council. Teacher-aldermen would still automatically be barred from voting on school estimates.

"There should be some control," said Alderman Ram. "It is conceivable that we might have eight teachers on council."

"That's quite democratic if the people want it," Alderman Hills replied.

## Old Post Office As Reading Room Is Not Feasible

Prince Rupert Women's Coordinating Council whose worthy objective is to make things easier for the city's elder citizens is seeking to have the old military post office on Third Avenue turned into a reading room for older people but it is doubtful if the project will be successful.

Seeking city council support for the project, the Coordinating Council's plea ran into several snags at last night's city council meeting when it was pointed out that (1) the building does not belong to the city (2) the land on which it is situated belongs to the federal government (3) it does not come up to the fire zoning regulations required for a public building.

Aldermen expressed sympathy with the Co-ordinating Council's plan and went on record as stating that anything further that could be done in that regard would be pursued.

## B.C. Unions and Vets Will Stage Big Labor Lobby

VANCOUVER — The full weight of British Columbia's labor organizations, backed by veterans' groups, are to participate in a pressure campaign on the B. C. government next month in an effort to get legislation passed for a 40-hour week, a fixed minimum wage and vacations with pay. Unionists say that between 500 and 600 union delegates from various sections of the province will take part in the "biggest labor lobby in the history of B. C. and even in Canada."
