LONDON (P) - A new crop of rumors that Ernest Bevin might resign from office sprouted over the week-end as the harrassed British foreign secretary lay tired and ill, and Prime Minister Attlee took his place at the Paris peace conference. Some quarters said that Bevin is "fed up" with his exposed "target" post in the cabinet.

Momentous Session of Nations Gets Under Way in Paris Today

PARIS-With 21 members of the United Nations in attendance and representatives of five defeated nations-Italy, Bulgaria, Rumania, Finland and Hungary-invited, the peace conference following World War II got formally under way at historic Luxembourg Palace today. President George Bedault of France made the opening ad-

The conference will discuss draft treaties as sent up from the recent conferences of the Big Four foreign ministers and will consider amendments that may be offered at the conference it-

Secretary of State James Byrnes of the United States held that all sessions of the conference should be open. He expressed the hope that all the peace treaties would be signed before the delegates left.

Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King of Canada said nothing should be cut and dried but there should be ample opportunity for discussion by all con-

The peace treaty with Germany does not come up at this conference.

Prime Minister Clement Attlee heads the British delegation in place of Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin, who is ill. Secretary of State James Byrnes is here from the United States, Foreign Commissar V. M. Moletov from LONDON-The British gov- Russia and Prime Minister Mackenzie King from Canada.

ARMY SEEKS HITLER AIDE

NUERNBERG (P)—United States officers reported today that Martin Borrmann, Hitler's deputy party leader who has been missing since Berlin's fall, was seen in Munich only a week ago and that a house-to-house search for him is proceeding. Bormann was long believed to be dead. He is being tried in absentia as one of 22 Nazi defendants by the international mili-
