Trade Dep't Issues Order

Minister Gives Blessing to Port-May Be Permanently Helpful

A decision which will vitally affect the export to a possible permanent export trade from Prince Rupert to Alaska was received today from Trade and Conimerce Minister James A. Mac-Kinnon, by E. T. Applewhaite, secretary of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce.

The decision, sent by telegram to Mr. Applewhaite, allows exporters to submit applications for export permits, listing goods which they propose to ship during any three months period.

The decision of the Minister, according to Mr. Applewhaite, contradicts a ruling of the processing officer for the export permits branch, which up to the present time has forced local wholesalers to give a detailed report of each shipment made, a slow and costly process which local shippers have objected to.

In removing the obstruction from the paths of local wholesalers who are endeavoring to establish Prince Rupert as an export port for goods going to Alaska, the Minister of Trade and Commerce gave his direct blessing with the words that "We appreciate the possibility of developing the Alaskan trade and will do everything possible to The order followed weeks of facilitate your exporters within the limits of available supplies."

Here is the text of Hon. Mr. on government terms. The MacKinnon's telegram in answer newspaper Hsin Min Pao said: to a protest longed recently by "It is entirely in accord with the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce:

"Suggest interested exporters submit by airmail export permit applications listing goods which they propose to ship in any three-month period. Not necessary to obtain individual permits covering each individual shipment. We appreciate possibility of developing Alaskan trade through Prince Rupert and will do everything possible to facilitate your exporters within the limit of available supplies. Regret cannot give you unlimited approval in advance of specific information covering commodities and quantities."
