We understand that move afoot for the Y.M.C.A. building in Prince Rupert to be turned over to the Army and Reserve Army in this area on termination of its occupancy by the Y.M.C.A. We the undersigned chapters of the I.O.D.E. emphatically protest against this. A telegram from the Department of War Services stating that this building would be made available to be used as a civic centre was read at a public meeting here and we emphatically protest against the government repudiating their pledged word. There are many buildings here now vacant which would be suitable for Army purposes but only this one is suitable for a civic centre building.

Tormentine, N.B., and Borden, P.E.I.

The master set, housed in a cabin on the boat deck of ss Prince Rupert, just aft of the wheelhouse, contains the transmitter, receiver, timing circuits and a display scan. A repeater on the bridge brings the picture directly to the navigator. The radar antenna, or aerial, is mounted on the ship's foremast.

The display is the type known as PPI, or plain position indicator, and resembles a chart, showing only the objects which are above the surface of the water, with the ship at the centre of the scan.

Large ships may be seen up to fifteen miles distance, small craft up to three miles, while mountainous coastlines may be seen 30 miles away. A very clear picture is given of narrow coastal channels.

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NAVAL CUSTOMS AND TRADITIONS NO. 1

THE NAVAL COLLAR: When sailors favoured pigtails as a mark of their distinctive occupation, the tar and grease applied to keep the pigtails stiff soiled the jumper — so colourful "Jack Tar" wore a wide collar. In 1857, the addition of three rows of white tape was authorized — and contrary to popular belief are not symbolic of three great British naval victories. The reason remains unknown.

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
