# SCOTS MUST PAY FOR THEIR GOLF AT ST. ANDREW'S

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland—The thrifty Scots of St. Andrews fingered their wallets today and muttered against the passing of their generations-old privilege to play golf for free on the famed St. Andrews courses.

Despite protests, the town council won governmental approval of an order authorizing to assess every St. Andrews taxpayer up to \$8.00 a year to play on the four town-owned links.

A parliamentary commission agreed, however, that children under 14 can play for nothing on the two newest courses, the Eden and the Jubilee links. So the youngsters can go on learning their golf from the time they're new high to a putter.

Also, the Royal and Ancient Club, which has its quarters on the "old" and "new" championship courses, will have to pay more for its privileges.

The commissioners said the town couldn't charge the townspeople to play unless the Royal and Ancient chipped in one-third more than its average contribution from 1936 to 1938 to help maintain the two championship courses. The order will have to be confirmed by an act of Parliament—usually only a formality, once the commissioners have ruled on it.

Outlanders—neither citizens of St. Andrews nor members of the Royal and Ancient—always have had to pay stiff fees to traverse the deep bunkers and tricky ditches. They'll still have to pay.

## ROOSEVELT GYM IS REAL ASSET

A visit to the Roosevelt Park gymnasium impresses one with realization of the asset that this building can be to the community if the sports enthusiasts and supporters in the city make proper use of it.

It is probable that lacrosse will be the feature game there. The netting is now available and will be put up immediately. The corners of the playing surface are being fenced off so as to eliminate the right-angled corners that hold up play and make for unnecessary nazards. Removable fences have been provided opposite exits so that they may be removed when not needed. Fire exits have been cleared of obstructions, and new doors made from the playing area.

Rest rooms have been arranged. There are public rooms for ladies and men. The players' quarters have also been overhauled. For girls' games there are all facilities with showers for visitors and home teams.

The storage rooms have much equipment. This includes the boxing ring, tumbling mats, weight lifting apparatus, springboards, and exercising equipment. One specially notable piece of equipment is a wrestling mat 20 feet square. This is a piece of equipment and the city is fortunate in being able to possess it.

Civic Centre director, Don Forward, and Rap Rec director Neil Ross, have put in a lot of time in getting this equipment checked and properly stored away. The lacrosse players are to be congratulated on the voluntary work they have done.

And now it is up to the players and team managers to see that the accommodation and equipment are properly handled. It is necessary that equipment be cared for when in use and equally necessary that it be put away after use. There is also the matter of cost to be considered. The heating system is adequate but costs money to operate. There is the lighting. There is janitor service and general upkeep. It is to be hoped that the users and citizens generally will be prepared to see that all these expenses are taken care of and the necessary funds provided to take care of maintenance and operation. Visitors are amazed at the equipment we have. It is up to us to take care of it. Altogether the city is unusually well provided with playing facilities. Let us all make use of it to the best advantage.

During the war, the squadron took part in the air campaign against Germany, flying more than 13,000 operational hours by night and over 1,000 hours by day. It participated in the 1,000 bomber raid on Cologne, bombed the Gneisenau and the Gneisenau took part in daylight raids on Berlin and carried out a bombing mission to Trieste. It also gave heavy support in Normandy on D-Day and in the coastal gun-sites before the Allied landing. After the invasion of the continent had made headway, the Squadron was attached to dropping food supplies to starved civilians and inmates of concentration camps.
