

RAINMAKERS WIN FIFTH HOOP GAME

Big Night for Bo-Me-Hi in Basketball Leagues

Bo-Me-Hi's gold and green tidal wave washed over Co-op to give the students their fifth straight victory in Senior "B" basketball play in the Civic Centre gym last night, while in "A" league, Packers defeated Savoy to win the second of the five games they have played this season.

In the ladies' league, High School Rainbirds rolled through the routine of defeating Peoples Store for the fifth straight time, while in the Junior league, Grotto beat Watts & Nickerson in the second of their season's two encounters.

Co-op was penalized for 11 fouls, out of which High School salvaged five counters, and Co-op scored on four of the nine free throws. Co-op's high scorer Peterson, with 12 points.

Packers zonal play tactics won them a victory over Savoy despite Ted Arney's scoring virtuosity which netted him the highest individual score, not only for Savoy, but for both teams.

Packers claimed a single point lead at the end of the first quarter, which they widened to two points at half time. Half time score was 19-17 for Packers. Packers scoring spree in the third quarter, led by Alex Bill, widened the chasm to 33-24 at three-quarter time. In spite of a solid offensive by Savoy in the final quarter, they managed to reduce Packers' nine-point lead by only one point.

Savoy took excellent advantage of the free shots awarded by the referee. Out of 16 free throws, Savoy players made 12 of them count. Savoy were penalized for seven fouls and Packers made four of the seven shots count.

Highest individual scores were run up by Arney of Savoy with 13 points and by Calderone of Packers with 9 points.
