

# Home Recipe

Here is gnocchi, an Italian before retiring. delicacy, which was popular with the boys overseas. With a green vegetable or salad it makes a delicious and nourishing main meal. Here is the recipe, in quantities sufficient for four

1/2 pint milk and ½ pint water 1 pint milk

51/2 level tablespoons seminols 21/2 oz. grated cheese 1½ oz. butter 1 level teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon nutmeg Pinch of cayenne pepper Bring the milk to the boil with half the butter; remove from heat and stir in the semolina slowly, return and cook for 15 minutes very gently, stirring all the time to prevent it from sticking to the pan. Take the pan off the fire and add the salt and nutmeg with half the grated cheese. Beat well. The mixture ought now to be smooth thick paste. Spread it out on a shallow dish or baking tin, flattening it with a wooden spoon to a thickness of 1/2 to 3/4 of an inch. Let it cool and when cold cut it into small rounds or squares.
