IMPROVING OF COMMUNICATION

Microwave Radio Relay Being Adopted by C.N.R. and C.P.R.

MONTREAL—Following the announcement in May of last year of their intention jointly to make practicable investigation of microwave radio relay systems, the communications department of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways have been carrying out field tests leading to the selection and acquisition of sites for intermediate relay stations between Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto.
The railways report that satisfactory progress is being made and it is anticipated that more advanced experimental work will be undertaken in the near future. Particular characteristics of these systems are freedom from static, fading and man-made interference such as caused by ignition systems, diathermy equipment etc.
It is anticipated that the effects of aurora which have caused so much trouble to existing communications system in recent days will be greatly alleviated if not eliminated.
