Chicago Black Hawks, managed by Tommy Gorman, won the Stanley Cup 12 years ago tonight by defeating Detroit's Red Wings 1-0 in the final game of the series at Chicago. It was the first time the Hawks had captured the title. The next year Gorman switched to Montreal Maroons and won the cup again.

The Bruins matched goal for goal with the Flying Frenchmen until the third period when their defence collapsed to enable Toe Blake, Murph Chamberlain and Dutch Hillier to waltz through for goals.

The three other Canadian goals were scored by Elmer Lach, Bobby Filion and Kenny Mosdell.

The Boston goals were divided between Bill Cowley, Bobby Bauer and Milt Schmidt.

The Canadiens led 3-2 at the end of the first period but the Bruins tied it up in the second frame with the only goal of the period.
