I.O.D.E. Sees Need of Fostering It—Queen Mary Chapter Meets

Mrs. Blackaby urged that members and friends continue with their knitting and sewing as the need is desperate and money cannot buy the articles for which the stricken people cry.

Mrs. J. R. Carr reported that quantities of wool and materials are available to be made up but more workers would be welcome.

Mrs. E. V. Whitting reported that during the month a consignment of used clothing valued at \$50 and largely donated by the Ideal Cleaners, had been repaired and shipped to Polish refugees.

Members are helping the I.O.D.E. Cancer Fund to the extent of \$1 each.

Reporting for the graves committee, Mrs. M. J. Keays stated that six headstones are needed at a cost of over \$20 each.

Further plans were made for the Queen Mary tea to be held on Easter Monday.

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
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
