ABOLITION OF VETO

THE ABOLITION of the veto in matters of atomic control is desirable. It would be a most valuable beachhead in the fight to abolish the veto entirely, and thus open the way for genuine world government and the reign of law among nations. But it cannot be agreed that an atomic treaty would be meaningless without it.

The enforcement of punitive measures against a violator would be something so close to war that it is a little fantastic to believe that any major power which insisted on its sovereignty in all other spheres of action would accept the decision of the remaining Council in such a Plans for a \$300,000 luxury dered to shoot rioters on sight case. The United Nations is not a world government, and the two nations which are probably most loath to make the real sacrifice of national sovereignty required for world government are the Soviet Union and the United States.

> Under these circumstances, if the elimination of the veto issue from the atomic control discussions would win an agreement for international inspection, a very good bargain could be made.

READY TO BE PICKED

WITH the Army Engineers having II decided and recommended months ago how much the city of Prince Rupert is entitled to in the way of recompense for war damage to streets and facilities, which amount is substantially in the six figures, it is to be presumed that the city will exert

every pressure to have the settlement effected by the payment without undue delay of the money upon which agreement appears to have been reached. There is reason to believe that a little pressure at this time might have the desired effect. On the other hand, there is no reason to believe that the money will not just fall into the city's lap. There should be no bogging down anywhere now. The money is badly needed to help in reconditioning the deplorable streets.

A WELCOME GIFT

IT IS A GRACIOUS GRANT that the provincial government has made in its offer to pay one-third of a proportionate cost up to \$25,000 of the new Pioneers' Home building here. It is fitting enough that the city fathers should appreciate it. On the other hand, the province might be considered to have a sufficient enough interest in the old timers to make the grant fully justified even if there might have been nothing to compel them to make it.

And, as the council emphasized, the fact of this gift having come, should not in any way discourage any other help to the project, all of which will be needed and will go to the end of making life a little more easy and comfortable for worthy although possibly not so very well fixed older citizens.


