man of the educational fund mentioned, as well as president of the Sprott-Shaw business schools in Vancouver and a member of the board which selects deserving students.

In these capacities she has followed closely the lives of former students receiving I.O.D.E. scholarships. Among many she mentioned are Matthew Halton, George Pepper, head of the Research Council; John Petting-skill, head of the Japanese commission; John Linford, inventor of a device which warded off magnetic mines during the war; Wallace Kirkconnell, advisor on Canadian immigration problems; Miss Elizabeth Monks of Montreal, first lady alderman of that city, also the new Dean of Women at Queen's University.

Mrs. Sprott also believes that Canada has everything in the world excepting enough people, stating that the policy of the I.O.D.E. was to encourage good stock, particularly artisans, with a preponderance of the British strain.

This means that the Daughters of the Empire must continue their work helping newcomers to become good citizens.

"There are more chapters and more members per chapter than ever before," she said, and she challenged the junior chapters to carry on as the reinforcements of the future.


Mrs. D. C. Stuart, Municipal regent, presented Mrs. Sprott with a corsage, also an engraved silver spoon given by the members of the order as a memento of her visit here.
