HOW CAN I ???

Q. How should silverware be cleaned?

A. Scouring silverware often scratches it. To clean it without scouring use an old aluminum pan. Put water, common salt and baking soda in the pan. Use one teaspoon each of salt and baking soda for each quart of water. Place the pan over a flame and heat until the tarnish disappears from the silver. Then wash in hot, soapy water.

Q. How can I make lacquer be used for refinishing brass fixtures?

A. By dissolving ten cents' worth of gum shellac in enough alcohol to make a thin solution. Apply it with a small soft brush.

Q. How can I remove the cereal that sticks to the vessel in which it has been cooked?

A. Add a cupful of wood ashes, then fill with water and leave to soak.

MECHANICAL SORTER
