### HOW CAN I ???

### RUPERT NOT BADLY OFF

Ready-to-Wear Supply Situation Here Better Than Elsewhere—Local Man in New York After Nylon Sale

"Prince Rupert ready-to-wear stores have proportionately more merchandise than those of Vancouver or Montreal and Canadian stores appear to have more on their shelves, bare as they may seem, than those in the United States."

Such is the observation of L. M. Felsenthal, manager of the local People's Store organization, who returned to the city Wednesday from a business trip south and east.

Mr. Felsenthal hastened to add, however, that there was no improvement in the supply situation in Canada and no immediate prospect of an improvement. From coast to coast on both sides of the line shortages of merchandise continue acute.

Mr. Felsenthal visited such cities as Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver. He also crossed the line and was in New York and Pittsburgh. His mother and sister are in the latter city.

The local business man happened to be in New York the day after nylons went on sale in the big Gimbel store. They advertised 26,000 pair going on sale. Before 1 p.m. 30,000 women had tried to buy them. The store was so jammed that the women could hardly move. Three whole floors were roped off in aisles and there were police patrols.

### MORE FABRIC BEING MADE

CANBERRA, Australia—Australia, the world's largest wool producer, now is manufacturing woolen fabrics on a large scale.

Recent development of attractively patterned light-weight woolen sheers gives wool, the best-wearing fabric, a new versatility and glamor.

New results are being obtained by the use of extra fine yarns, combined with production of intricate fancy weaves by expert textile designers. Shrink-resistant, uncrushable, easy to wash and iron, the light weight and smoothness of texture of the new woolen fabrics make them ideal for year-round wear.

Materials at present in production in Australia weigh four ounces per square yard. Weight is expected to be cut to 2½ ounces per square yard very shortly. Weight of normal woolen fabrics varies from six to eight ounces per square yard.

Production cost of woolen sheers is low. Present Australian retail prices of various types are: unpatterned sheer wool, \$1.32 per yard of 30 inches width; two-tone screen-printed sheers, \$2.36 per yard of 30 inches width; wool sheers, hand-printed in individual designs, \$5.59 per square yard.
