### TRADES SCHOOL ATTRACTS GIRLS

#### Many Provinces Represented at Re-establishment Institute

TORONTO—Most girls are interested in the careers of their future husbands, but few are as methodical about it as Miss A. E. Burrell of Winnipeg who is taking a watchmaker's course here.

A student in the course in horology—that's watchmaking—at the Toronto Training and Re-establishment Institute, Miss Burrell has another nine months to put in on the year-long course in the fine art of tuning up time-pieces before joining her fiancée who is also a watchmaker.

Commandant of the Toronto institute, which offers 25 courses besides watchmaking, is Lt.-Col. J. M. Muir, formerly head of the Army educational centre at North Bay, Ont.

"There's nothing like this course even though the government allowance doesn't cover all my expenses," Miss Burrell said. She served in the Women's Division of the R.C.A.F. as an instrument maker, and spent most of her service career in Ottawa. The government allowance she receives as a veteran in training is \$60 a month.

Miss Burrell was the only girl seated at the rows of benches which fill the horology department, although the lathes which are essential equipment in the trade appeared as shiny as the instruments of a super-house-keeper.

The course is overflowing with students so classes have to be run on a shift basis. One starts at 8 a.m. and continues till 3 p.m. and 20 minutes later the second shift comes to class.

#### Studies With Her Husband

Mrs. Winnifred Callas of Edmonton was on the second shift and is the only other woman among the 69 students studying watchmaking. A former Wren, Mrs. Callas is taking the course beside her husband, C. E. Callas, who was in the Air Force.

Some 200 ex-servicewomen are studying at the institute which has a total enrolment of 3,700. Former Cwacs, Wids and Wrens are also enrolled in the courses of hairdressing, restaurant cooking, matriculation and stenography.

The hairdressing course, where there are as many men as women, is unique in Canada, says P. R. Huta of Regina, chief instructor. The course is run like a salon with the general public as the assignments. Cosmetology chemistry and make-up are some of the subjects taught.

Five girls among 70 men have

the run of a modern kitchen in the chefs and baker's course. Using the most up-to-date equipment they study their trade as well as help feed the students in the adjoining school cafeteria.

Besides being fed right on the school grounds the ex-servicewoman can get her spring outfit there. The products of the needle trade course are for sale at cost price to the students at the institute.

Ex-servicewomen say that social life is not organized at the school, but Toronto is not as bad a place to live in as they had been led to believe.

### FAMILY MAKES OWN VIOLINS

#### 17-Year Old Plays Instrument Finished After 200 Hours Work

TORONTO, — The Stradivari violin, famous 18th century violin makers, may have their counterpart in the Innes family of Toronto who are playing instruments of their own making in Toronto music circles today.

James Innes Sr., a member of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, learned to make violins in Canada under a teacher named Kusack who, like the famous Antonio Stradivari, took the secret of his special varnish with him when he died.

Along with devising a varnish formula of his own, Mr. Innes taught 17-year old James Jr. the rudiments of the craft and after 200 hours' work, which kept his spare time occupied from August until after Christmas, the younger Innes finished his first violin.

James Jr. has used the instrument in his weekly work in a radio show where he took the place of his father who had to give up the assignment during the symphony season.

Another son, Bob, formerly of the R.C.A.F., also learned instrument making from his father. He is now making a viola while awaiting permission to go to the United States where he has a job with the chief violin-maker at a famous instrument making company.

Mr. Innes Sr. thinks that Canadian spruce and curly maple, the woods used in his violins are just as good as those from Europe and perhaps better as in some cases they are harder. Each violin gets about eight coats of varnish with long drying periods between each coating.

He believes that modern violins are just as good as those made by the old masters, but the moderns will not get recognition until they have been dead and buried a long time.

#### NOTTS COAL FIELD

LONDON, — A new coal area containing vast reserves of virgin coal has been opened up in Nottingham, England. It is estimated that the area contains 125,000,000 tons of proved coal, which would provide work for some 1,000 men for the next 125 years.
